Many of us who choose music as a profession eventually face the reality that teaching may be a necessary component of our income-generating efforts. Whether teaching is central to our professional lives or we were simply students of a great teacher at one time, we, as musicians, are familiar with the myriad approaches to learning an instrument or tradition. This issue of *Canadian Folk Music* aims to capture some of the challenges – and ultimate solutions – that are unique to the transmission of traditional music. New methologies enabled by the internet are complicated by the absence of a real-life teacher, as discussed by Stephanie Horak, Meghan Forsyth, and Janice Tulk, or by the divorcing of a tradition from its original cultural context, as explored by Mats Melin.

We have a substantial review section this issue; John Leeder has gathered many, and includes here a special feature on the remastered Stan Rogers recordings recently released by Borealis Records.
