John Leeder surprises us this issue by extending "Treasures from our Archives" back 30 years, something I hope continues in future columns. You might be pleased to see how many of our members, many of them still writing for *CFM*, have been contributing all this time. We finish off with reviews of albums by artists such as 100 Mile House, Jocelyn Pettit, and Corin Raymond.
