

### Contributors/Collaborateurs

**Roland Bohr** of Dortmund, Germany, studied history and archeology at the University of the Ruhr in Bochum, Germany, where he received his MA degree in history in 1998. In June 2006 he completed his dissertation at the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg on continuity and change in historical indigenous hunting and military technology on the northern Great Plains and in the Hudson Bay Lowland, from 1670 to 1870. He is currently an assistant professor for Canadian Aboriginal history with the Department of History at the University of Winnipeg.

**Renée Bondy** is a graduate student in History at the University of Waterloo. Her doctoral thesis, in progress under the direction of Dr. Wendy Mitchinson, is a history of women's religious communities and organizational reform in the Vatican II era. In recent years, Renée has presented her work at numerous conferences, including last year's "Oral History in Canada Conference" at the University of Winnipeg. Renée is a regular contributor to the *Catholic New Times* and recently published in *Bitch: A Feminist Critique of Pop Culture*.

**Colonel (Retired) Angus Brown** designed the Canadian War Museum's Oral History Program in 1999 and is the Program Director. He served in the Canadian Armed Forces for 35 years, holding command positions in Egypt, Canada, Germany and the United States. Since retirement he has worked as a consultant in the Ottawa area. He is the co-author, with Dr. Richard Gimblett, of *In the Footsteps of the Canadian Corps*, a book launched in April, 2006, detailing the Canadian Army experience in the Great War.

**Caroline Forcier Holloway** is an Acquisition Archivist at Library and Archives Canada. She acquires French and English, private and public moving image and sound documents. During her 16 years at LAC, she has worked as a Reference Archivist and an Audio-Visual Content Specialist. She advises regional groups to ensure best practice approaches to archiving oral history and to assist in developing oral history programs. She has served for many years as Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Oral History Association.

**Alexander Freund** is an associate professor of history at the University of Winnipeg, where he also holds the Chair in German-Canadian Studies. He has worked in oral history since his M.A. studies at Simon Fraser University in 1993-4. His dissertation, published in 2004, was based on oral history interviews with German immigrants in Canada and the United States. Previously he worked as Program Associate at Columbia University's Oral History Research Office.

**James H. Morrison** is currently Acting Director of Continuing Education and served as Chair of Asian Studies and Professor of History at Saint Mary's University, Halifax. He received his PH. D. from the University of Ibadan, Nigeria, specializing in African oral tradition. He is past President of COHA, past editor of the *COHA Journal* and current Book Review editor of *Forum*. Recently his oral history book, *Oral History in Southeast Asia* (1998) was translated into Bahasa Indonesian (Sejarah Lisan di Asia Tenggara). He has been involved with COHA for more than 30 years.

**Mark Ruml** is currently teaching at the University of Winnipeg. He also serves as Research Director for the Cultural e-zine (electronic magazine) [www.whitebuffaloonline.net](http://www.whitebuffaloonline.net) of The White Buffalo Spiritual Society, a non-profit Aboriginal organization dedicated to healing by providing and promoting traditional teachings and healing ceremonies. The Cultural E-zine includes audio and visual recordings of interviews with Elders, sacred sites, traditional songs, traditional stories, traditional teachings, news, and events. Along with continued involvement in Aboriginal projects and education, he has taught Aboriginal Religious Traditions at Brandon University and elsewhere.

**Trudy Sable**, Ph. D. in Educational Studies, is the Director of the Office of Aboriginal and Northern Research at the Gorsebrook Research Institute and Adjunct Professor of Anthropology at Saint Mary's University. She is currently in collaboration with the Innu Nation of Labrador and Environment Canada developing the Innu Environmental Guardians Program. The IEGP is a unique, in-community, Innu-driven, educational program integrating Innu environmental knowledge with western scientific environmental disciplines. She is the University of the Arctic council representative for St. Mary's University and member of the Northern Studies Committee.

**Steven Schwinghamer** is the Research Co-ordinator at Pier 21 National Historic Site in Halifax, Nova Scotia. His work includes conducting interviews for the site's oral history project, which gathers accounts from immigrants and from Second World War merchant mariners, veterans, war brides and child evacuees. He maintains partnership projects for Pier 21 in various areas, including public history. He is a graduate student in history at Saint Mary's University.

**Patricia Skidmore** is currently on sabbatical leave from Brescia University College in London, Ontario, where she teaches an oral history methodology course. Her published research articles integrate oral history with documentary sources. She is completing a five year term as Chair of the Canadian Oral History Association and has edited *Forum* since 2002. She presents workshops on oral history techniques and standards and has assisted Parks Canada, the Ontario Association of Archivists and others.
