




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Message from Jim McLean

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
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'Even light exercise' aids health

Even low levels of weekly exercise could help reduce blood pressure and improve fitness, scientists say.

Experts say walking for half an hour, five days a week, is the minimum required to achieve health benefits.

But a Journal of Epidemiology and Community Health report from Northern Ireland found walking on just three days a week gave similar benefits.

The finding could encourage those with sedentary lifestyles to take up exercise gradually, the authors say.

This could be helpful as few people currently meet the minimum recommendations for exercise, with many saying they do not have enough time.

Urgent reminder to all Canadian Volkssporters ordering supplies or making payments

to the American Volkssport Association.

Unfortunately, American banking regulations do not allow Canadians to make payments by cheque, even in American funds, to the AVA office. This is due to a difference in the tracking numbers marked on the cheques themselves. Canadian tracking numbers are not recognized by the American banking system. The best way to effect payment is by calling the AVA office up and giving them a credit card number, such as VISA. Canadian postal money orders in American funds MAY be acceptable, but this is not certain at this time. A credit card is certainly the preferred means.

Cette difficulté est le résultat de différences entre les numéros de suivi indiqués sur les chèques même. Les numéros de suivi canadiens ne sont pas reconnus par le système bancaire américain. La meilleure façon d'effectuer un paiement est de téléphoner directement au bureau de l'AVA et leur donner le numéro d'une carte de crédit, telle la VISA. Les mandats postaux canadiens, en devises américaines, sont PEUT-ÊTRE acceptables, mais ce n'est pas tout à fait certain pour le moment. Mieux vaut utiliser une carte de crédit.

President's Message

It has been a busy period lately, with much to do to end the 2007 year and start anew for 2008. The renewal process for walks and memberships has gone pretty smoothly, with a few bumps here and there. Of greatest concern is the smaller number of scheduled events sanctioned so far. This will represent a significant amount of revenue to the CVF, requiring adjustments to the budget if the total does not increase. We have yet to receive complete information from a couple of clubs, but expect to hear from them early in the New Year. Unfortunately, two clubs

have decided not to renew their memberships: the Victoria International Walking Festival and the Chebucto Hiking Club. The former had been announced previously, and we received news of the latter club in late October. One new club, however, will be added when complete information has been received. This new club will be in Hay River, NWT.

I am pleased to tell you that the Board of Directors has received and approved an application to hold the CVF AGM in 2009. It will be held in North Bay, ON and be a joint effort of the Gateway Walkers of North Bay and the Walking and Volkssport Association of Ontario. It will be held at Nipissing University from May 22 to 24, 2009. A post-convention tour to numerous cities and communities in 'northern' Ontario is being considered.

Readers will remember that I have expressed concerns about the IVV in my last two messages. I must now give you some further details because motions for our own AGM and the IVV Congress of Delegates will soon be due and the next issue of Volkssport Canada in April would be too late to bring you up to date and meet the terms of our own constitution. In short, group of ten central European countries hijacked all but one of the positions on the IVV Presidium at the recent Congress of Delegates in Otepää, Estonia. They effectively threw out the IVV constitution and simply demanded that everyone resign. Many serious procedural errors were made in the way the meeting was conducted. A demand for the Presidium to resign before the end of 2006 had been made previously and, when they refused, secret meetings were held to plan the take-over. We wrote letters asking for proof that these individuals were acting with the knowledge, consent and direction of their national associations, but no replies were ever received. This was not due to be an election year, but the President had given notice of his intention to resign, effective the recent Congress in July. The IVV constitution clearly states, at that point, that two of the elected Vice-Presidents were to assume his duties until the natural end of his term. That was not allowed to happen. False accusations were made against individuals, most notably the American Vice-President, Lynn Clark, who demanded an investigation by the

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L'on a dû travailler très fort dernièrement afin de conclure cette année dernière et repartir de nouveau dans l'année nouvelle. Le processus de renouvellement des sanctions des marches s'est déroulé sans trop de difficultés, mais non sans quelques petits hics çà et là. Notre plus grand souci est le plus faible nombre d'événements sanctionnés jusqu'ici. Cette diminution constituera une baisse de revenu importante pour la FCV, nécessitant des ajustements au budget si le total n'augmente pas. Nous attendons toujours les données de quelques clubs, mais nous anticipons leurs nouvelles au début du nouvel an. Malheureusement, deux clubs ont choisi de ne pas renouveler leur adhésion à

la FCV: le Victoria International Walking Festival et le Chebucto Hiking Club. Celui-là avait annoncé son départ antérieurement et celui-ci nous a fait connaître sa décision vers la fin d'octobre. Un nouveau club, cependant, s'inscrira sur nos registres dès que nous aurons reçu toutes ses données. Ce dernier se trouvera à Hay River, dans les Territoires du Nord-Ouest.

Il me fait plaisir de pouvoir vous annoncer que le conseil d'administration a reçu et approuvé une demande d'organiser le congrès annuel de la FCV en 2009. Il aura lieu à North Bay, ON et sera une collaboration du club des Gateway Walkers de North Bay et de l'Association de Marche et de Volkssport de l'Ontario. Le congrès aura lieu à l'Université Nipissing du 22 au 24 mai, 2009. On planifie un voyage organisé après le congrès dans cette région du nord de l'Ontario.

Vous vous souviendrez que j'ai exprimé des soucis a l'égard de l'IVV dans mes deux derniers messages. Il me faut maintenant vous donner de plus amples renseignements à ce suiet puisqu'il faudra bientôt considérer les propositions possibles pour notre congrès annuel et le congrès IVV, mais le prochain numéro de Volkssport Canada au mois d'avril paraîtra trop tard pour vous en informer et satisfaire les exigences de notre propre constitution. En bref, un groupe de dix pays de l'Europe centrale se sont emparés de tous les postes du présidium IVV, sauf un, au dernier congrès à Otepää, en Estonie. Dans ce dessein, ils ont rejeté la constitution IVV et demandé la démission de tous les membres du présidium. On a fait de nombreuses erreurs dans la direction la réunion. Ces dix pays avaient fait cette demande antérieurement avant la fin de l'an 2006 et, quand le présidium a refusé de démissionner, les dix pays ont tenu des réunions secrètes pour planifier leur putsch. Nous avons envoyé des lettres pour demander des preuves que ces gens agissaient au su et avec le consentement et la direction de leurs associations nationales, mais on n'a jamais reçu de réponse. On ne devait pas tenir des élections cette année, mais le président avait annoncé sa démission, qui devait entrer en vigueur au congrès au mois de juillet. La constitution explique très clairement que dans ces circonstances deux des viceprésidents élus doivent agir en commun jusqu'à la conclusion naturelle de la présidence. On n'a pas permis que cette conclusion

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IVV Disciplinary Board. She was totally vindicated in the report made to the Presidium, but that report was initially ignored and has not been acted upon since. Many other things have happened since the 'putsch', none of them authorized by the delegates at the Congresses in 2006 or 2007.

Since July, there has been little communication of any kind from the IVV. The minutes of the Congress of Delegates were received three and a half months late, and then only in Two other Presidium meetings have been held since, but no agendas or minutes have been received. No updates to the IVV web site have been made since April or May. No World Report has been published, although we have been told that it will now be published 'periodically' by Giuseppe Colantonio of Italy, one of the new Vice-Presidents. The new Presidium greatly underestimated the responsibilities they were assuming and have decided to have all the voluntary work done by the former members of the Presidium by paying the offices of the German Federation [DVV] to do it for them. This has arisen largely because the new IVV leadership has also remained as the national leaders of their respective associations, a clear conflict of interest situation, as explained below. The new Presidium has appointed three German-speaking individuals to completely rewrite the IVV Constitution and Regulations. No one else was asked for their input, nor given the opportunity to participate in this process. We have learned that these new documents will be sent to members in February 2008.

Why does this matter? To put it simply, it is because what happened was undemocratic, unconstitutional and quite possibly illegal. A house is only as strong as its foundation, and the IVV is our foundation. It was not impossible that someone could have lodged a complaint in the German courts about all this. In fact, the new Presidium expected such a move in the first thirty days after the Congress, but it turned out that no one could afford such an action. If the German courts determined that there had been irregularities, they could have disbanded the IVV and then we would be homeless, to use a simple metaphor. One country is already protesting the IVV decision, taken in July, to give the 2010 Olympiad to Turkey, when that country was not yet a full member of the IVV. We also pay the IVV over \$1,000 annually in fees. Why? What will we receive for those fees? Will the fees now increase because these new leaders have added to costs by not doing the work formerly done by volunteers? Since the new leaders have remained as the Presidents of their own national organizations, they are in clear conflict of interest. I am not at all comfortable with the fact that these same national leaders also have access to IVV assets, estimated at over US \$500,000.00.

Since the IVV Congress in July, we [the CVF and the AVA] have communicated our concerns to every other member of the IVV. In return, we have received expressions of concern and support from national associations in Scandinavia, the Baltic region and Eastern Europe. In September, the

L'on a fait de fausses allégations contre des individus, le plus notablement contre la vice-présidente américaine Lynn Clark, qui a demandé une enquête menée par la Cour de discipline IVV. Le rapport de cette cour auprès du présidium l'a complètement disculpée, mais à première vue on n'en a pas tenu compte et n'en a rien fait depuis. Ce nouveau présidium a fait de nombreuses autres choses depuis leur *putsch*, sans l'autorisation des délégués aux congrès en 2006 ou 2007.

Depuis le mois de juillet, on n'a reçu presque aucune communication de l'IVV. On a reçu le procès-verbal du Congrès des délégués en juillet avec trois mois et demi de retard, et ce seulement en allemand. Deux autres réunions du présidium ont eu lieu depuis juillet, mais on n'en a reçu ni les agendas ni les procès-verbals. On n'a fait aucune mise à jour du site Internet IVV depuis les mois d'avril ou de mai. Aucun numéro du Rapport mondial IVV n'a été publié, mais on nous a dit que dorénavant ce document sera publié par Giuseppe Colantonio de l'Italie, l'un des nouveaux vice-présidents. Le nouveau présidium a grandement sous-estimé leurs nouvelles responsabilités et a décidé de faire faire tout le travail bénévole fait par les anciens membres du présidium en payant des services auprès du bureau de la fédération allemande [DVV]. Ce changement est le résultat principal du fait que les membres de la nouvelle direction IVV ont gardé leurs postes de présidents de leurs associations nationales respectives, soit en conflit d'intérêt évident, tel qu'expliqué ci-dessous. Le nouveau présidium a nommé trois individus germanophones pour remanier au complet la constitution et les règlements IVV. On n'a demandé la contribution de personne d'autre, ni donné l'occasion de participer à ce processus. Les membres nationaux devraient recevoir ces documents nouveaux en février 2008.

Pourquoi est-ce important? Tout simplement, c'est parce que ce qui s'est passé était anti-démocratique, contre la constitution et, très possiblement illégal. Une maison n'est aussi solide que son fondement, et l'IVV est notre fondement. Ce n'était pas du tout impossible que quelqu'un aurait pu porter plainte dans le système judicaire allemand sur tout ce qui s'est passé. De fait, le nouveau présidium s'y attendait pendant les trente jours qui ont suivi le congrès, mais personne n'avait les moyens d'une telle poursuite. Si la justice allemande avait déterminé qu'il y avait eu des irrégularités, ils auraient pu dissoudre l'IVV et, alors, on serait 'sans abri', pour suivre la métaphore. Un pays a déjà porté plainte contre la décision, prise au mois de juillet, d'attribuer l'Olympiade de 2010 à la Turquie, quand ce pays n'était pas encore membre de plein droit de l'IVV. De plus, nous contribuons annuellement des frais d'adhésion de plus de \$1,000 à l'IVV. Pourquoi? Qu'est-ce qu'on recevra pour ces frais? Est-ce que ces frais augmenteront maintenant parce que les nouveaux chefs ont ajouté aux dépenses en ne faisant plus le travail fait antérieurement par des bénévoles? Puisque les nouveaux chefs ont aussi retenu leurs postes de présidents nationaux de leurs associations respectives, ils se trouvent évidemment en conflit

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AVA formed an Advisory Committee to look at the relationship between the AVA and the IVV in the light of these developments. Similarly, I asked Vice-President Pinsonneault, aided by Directors Hansen and Olson, to chair a committee to draft a contingency plan for when the new IVV Constitution and Regulations are received, possibly in late February. There will be little time to react and meet the terms of our own constitution if we wish to make motions for our own AGM in Wolfville in May and the next Congress in York, England. It is too early yet to predict any future course of action, but I do expect the IVV to remain an open, democratic, inclusive and truly international organization that respects its goals and members' wishes. Let us not forget that the goal of the IVV has been "To contribute toward peace and understanding among nations by fostering international friendship through Volkssports". Since Directors and club presidents have been given a more complete description of what has happened, you may contact them or me directly if you have further questions.

To change the subject, I was invited to attend the AVA National Executive Council meeting in Mason, OH in late November. It was a pleasure to meet our American counterparts and discuss many items of mutual interest and concern. We already cooperate on a broad range of interests and I was also happy to share some resources and new ideas with them.

Good news! Unofficially, Canada had the greatest participation in the Guiness World Record Walk held on October 3rd. Several clubs participated in this event which promises to become an important one on an annual basis from now on. Obviously, we know that walking is the preferred means of exercise of a large number of Canadians, so let's get involved across the country next year. This is a free and very effective publicity opportunity for us. It will also marry well with our Independent Walker Program and the application to Bell Canada for a sponsorship. Depuis le congrès au mois de juillet, nous [la FCV et l'AVA] avons communiqué nos soucis à tous les autres membres de l'IVV. Par conséquent, des associations nationales en Scandinavie, dans la région baltique, et en Europe de l'Est ont aussi exprimé leurs soucis et leur appui. En septembre, l'AVA a créé un comité pour examiner le rapport entre 1 'AVA et l'IVV à la lumière de ces développements. Pareillement, j'ai demandé au vice-président Pinsonneault, secondé par les directeurs Hansen et Olson, de diriger un comité de planification des contingences pour quand on recevra la nouvelle constitution et les nouveaux règlements, anticipés au mois de février. Nous disposerons de peu de temps pour réagir et respecter les termes de notre propre constitution si nous voulons formuler des propositions pour le congrès FCV à Wolfville au mois de mai et pour le congrès IVV à York, Angleterre en juillet. 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Vice-President Report

This report covers the period from September 1st, 2007 to December 31st, 2007.

1. I assisted the Ontario Director and clubs in the drafting of the Bylaws of their newly formed provincial association, called "Walking &

Volkssport Association of Ontario/Association ontarienne de marche & de sports populaires". After 6 drafts, their Bylaws were finally approved by the First Directors on Saturday, October 20, 2007. The next step will be the convocation of the first Annual General Meeting of the Ontario Volkssport Clubs, scheduled for May 2008.

- 2. I continued to update the CVF Book of Remembrance. To date, 14 new additions have been received and processed since the beginning of 2007.
- 3. I translated into French the two new CVF Special Walking Programs for 2008: the Scholar Walking Program and the Winery, Cheese Factory and Brewery Walking Program, which are both now in Richard Parr's hands, the CVF Special Walking Programs Coordinator for their reproduction and distribution.
- 4. The CVF Board of Directors has approved at a meeting held on Sunday, November 4, 2007, the creation of an Ad Hoc Committee of three CVF Directors, chaired by myself, to develop a Contingency Plan in case the new IVV Statutes, Rules and Regulations to be presented, approved and voted upon in York, England, at the next IVV Congress of Delegates to be held on July 5, 2008, do not meet the CVF expectations. The Committee is composed of myself, CVF Vice-President, Ethel Hansen, British Columbia Director and Ole Olson, Ontario Director. A first draft is being circulated amongst the committee's members. Finally, our President and I are presently reviewing a draft letter addressed to a potential sponsor.

- 1. - 4. Le conseil d'administration de la FCV a approuvé lors d'une réunion tenue le dimanche, 4 novembre 2007, la création d'un Comité Ad hoc de trois directeurs de la FCV, présidé par moi, pour développer un plan de contingence au cas où les nouveaux statuts IVV, règles et règlements qui seront présentés pour approbation et vote à York, en Angleterre, lors du prochain congrès des délégués IVV, prévu pour le 5 juillet 2008, ne répondraient pas aux attentes de la FCV. Le Comité se compose de moi-même, vice-président de la FCV, d'Ethel Hansen, directrice de la Colombie-Britannique et d'Ole Olson, directeur de l'Ontario. Une première ébauche est déjà en circulation auprès des membres du comité.

Are Walking and Winter Compatible?

Walking is an exercise that requires no special abilities. We have been doing it since early childhood and possible injuries that could result from it seldom occur. Associated costs are minimal. Usually, the activity is free unless you are a member of a walking club where membership costs could apply. Good socks, a good pair of walking shoes/boots, as well as appropriate clothing, all of which you probably already own, is all that is required to practice this popular sport.

However, winter puts somewhat of a damper on this practice. Of course, snow, ice, black ice and all of Mother Nature's other whims are factors to be considered. Nonetheless, safe winter walking is always feasible in the National Capital Region (NCR). Group walking takes place every weekend from the beginning of November to the end of April, alternating between Saturdays and Sundays for fun, fitness and friendship of all the participants. These walks are usually followed by a group meal, in various restaurants in the NCR, as a social activity for those who want to join the group after a healthy walk.

Winterlude marks the beginning of the special scheduled events for the NCR walking clubs associated with the Canadian Volkssport Federation. There is either a walking or skating activity organized for each Saturday of those three weekends. A 5 or 10 km walk or skating on the Rideau Canal from Dows' Lake Pavilion are the first weekend's activities. For the second weekend, the walk starts from the YM/YWCA on Argyle St., in Ottawa, and brings you to the Confederation Park, across Ottawa's City Hall, to view the ice sculptures. As for the third weekend, the activity moves on the Quebec side, in Gatineau. We especially invite you to join us at the Casino du Lac Leamy for a walk through the Jacques-Cartier Park to enjoy the Winterlude activities on that side of the river, as well as the giant snow sculptures. Back to the Casino, fellow walkers are invited to join us to savour the Casino's excellent buffet and/or try your luck at the different games of chance offered by the Casino, if you so desire; a simple visit of the premises for first time visitors would be worthwhile.

You may ask yourself if there is a difference between a walking club and a hiking club. For the writer, the difference is significant: the hiking trails are much more challenging and adventurous than those used by our walking clubs. Most of the trails that we use in the NCR are less hilly/bumpy and are fairly well groomed with a low to moderate inclination, which is rarely significant. Our Trail Rating System is two-fold: the incline (from 1 to 5) and the terrain (from A to E). The greater the number/letter combination is, the more difficult the walk will be.

Some of our walks also bring us on the National Capital Greenbelt trail system, in areas such as Shirleys Bay, Stony Swamp, Pinhey Forest, Pine Grove, Mer Bleue and Green's Creek, as well as in the Gatineau Park. These walks are certainly a little bit more demanding and more of a hiking nature than our standard walking program. Every year, at the end of May, the Ottawa Voyageurs offer you a new place to discover. For example, in May 2006, we went to Casselman Village, Ontario. In May 2007, we discovered the Black Mountains' trails (Level 4C) in Ripon, Québec, and for May 2008, we are proposing to explore and rediscover Navan, Ontario.

The club membership for the Ottawa Voyageurs and the Nepean Nomads is very similar and is annually, roughly 150 members per club. Age average in both clubs is 50+. The average number of participants for a winter walk is between 30 and 40 people. For all the other scheduled events of the year, participation is around 60 walkers per event. All our walks have two walking distances: 5 km (one-hour walk) or 10 km (two-hour walk); sometimes the trails are fully marked and you only have to follow the markers, at other times, it is a guided or a map walk. Most of our walks have a social aspect attached to them, which is, usually, eating together in a restaurant or pub, after an outing; it could also be a BBQ and/or a corn roast hosted by one of the clubs at minimal cost.

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



Alberta Volkssporters Chowing Down

It was great again this year to lead a group of walks in the Okanagan in September. We were happy to have walkers from Ohio, Seattle and Alberta joining our BC walkers from Comox,

Courtenay and Victoria. This is always a special trip as wineries are open for tasting and I think everyone went home with at least a few bottles of wine. Some said the highlight of the trip is joining the members of the Peachland Volkssporting Club for their potluck following their walk. We will be doing this trip again next year, September 13-16, and will feature two map walks as well as YREs. One map walk, sponsored by the Peachland Volkssporting Club, will visit four wineries while the other map walk, sponsored by VABC will visit a winery that also makes cheese. The cheese is always a special treat.

BC has increased the number of YREs and Seasonals in 2008. There is a new YRE in Oliver, Summerland, Victoria (Saanich), Cedar and Nanaimo. Seasonals have been added in Golden, Ucluelet and Tofino. The walk in Golden features the 150 foot long free span timber pedestrian bridge, the longest of its kind in Canada.

Once again I plan on spending New Year's Eve doing a walk. The Juan de Fuca club starts a walk at 10:30 pm in Victoria-Esquimalt every year. Walkers get to enjoy the Christmas lights as the Club visits each house to alert them to the walk and snacks and a hot drink at midnight on the trail. It's always a special event doing this last walk in Canada for the year.

VABC will be holding their AGM and President's walk in Victoria – Esquimalt on April 20. Everyone is invited to attend the walk and meetings following.

Covered Bridge Walks in BC

Until CVF decided to have a joint Covered Bridge Walking Program with the American Volkssporting Association, I wasn't aware we had any covered bridges in BC. So far, we've found three to be included in the Covered Bridge Program.

Whistler: This was an existing route (YRE 064) that goes into the Village (the main tourist area in Whistler), to the bridge and around Lost Lake.

Keremeos: This was a town I had passed through on the Crowsnest Highway (Hwy 3) but never noticed anything of significance or even the name of the town. It was a surprise to look up covered bridges and to find one listed in Keremeos. It is called the Red Bridge and spans the Similkameen River. There is nothing very beautiful about the bridge but it is of historic significance. It was built by the Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern Railroad in 1907 during the area's gold mining era and is a reminder of that bygone time when the now abandoned railway ran up the Similkameen Valley. Today, this covered bridge is used as a highway bridge to the south side of the Similkameen River and to the Ashnola and Cathedral

Lakes Park. The route (YRE 302) uses the old rail line and goes to the bridge. From late spring into the fall, walkers may be serenaded by turkeys who live on a large farm along the route.

Golden: This is the newest route added for 2008 (M-SEAS 310 opening May 1 until October 15). The route crosses the Kicking Horse Pedestrian Bridge over the Kicking Horse River to follow the dikes along the river and the Rotary Trails system. This bridge is the longest authentic covered timber frame bridge in Canada. Planned as a community project, volunteers from Golden were joined by timber framers from the United States and also carpenters from Europe, who read about the project on the Internet. The European carpenters wore their traditional uniforms. The bridge structure was completed in September 2001. Because of the high waters in the fall, the installation of the bridge didn't occur until October 25. The installation took three full days. With the help of Sterling Cranes from Calgary, the structure was inched along and out onto a temporary footing, and finally onto the far shore where it was fitted into its concrete abutments. The bridge is 150 feet long, with a 210,000-pound Burr arch structure.

- Sept. 13 Westbank: This special event visits 4 wineries en route with tastings at each one.
- ◆ Sept 14 Penticton Naramata: Come to visit a winery

that makes four types of cheese. The cheese is becoming so popular that some types of their cheese may be sold out.

World Record Walk

-Brenda Dudfield Report about the Surrey Guinness World Record Walk Attempt

On Wednesday October 3, 2007 the Surrey Trekkers hosted a Guinness World Record Walk attempt for the largest number of people walking one kilometre simultaneously. The 1.25km event was held at Bear Creek Park (which is on the

Cedar Hills YRE Route) with 81 walkers from the Lower Mainland. The event was advertised within the community and 60 were non-volkssporters. There were 34 males and 47 females; 54 walked the 1 km and 27 did another 4 km so that Volkssporters could get credit for 5 km.

Surrey Deputy Mayor Marvin Hunt, and MLA Sue Hammel certainly helped to promote Volkssporting by mentioning it in their speech. Surrey Councillor Linda Hepner, Chair of the Parks & Recreation Commission, also spoke that this event helped in the goal to "Get Fit by 2010".

Quite a bit of Volkssporting information was given out with several people showing a lot of interest in the Club, although no one has joined us yet. A photographer from The Leader was in attendance and a report appeared in the paper.

There were over 2,000 walks across Canada representing 10 Provinces and one Territory trying to beat Western Australia's September 2006 record of 100,915 participants.

Unofficially, a new record has been set – **231,635** is the figure sent to Guinness for verification. Results by province are: - British Columbia 2,901; Alberta 30,945; Saskatchewan 4,226; Manitoba 28,715; Ontario 160,048; Quebec 364; New Brunswick 2,887; Prince Edward Island 760; Nova Scotia 334; Newfoundland and Labrador 25; Yukon 430.


