

### Word from the President

I am still adjusting to my new position as President of the Canadian Volkssport Federation (CVF) and turning over my functions with the Ottawa Voyageurs Walking Club to my replacement. Both are coming along well although sometimes it seems to me, too slowly. However, I have to keep in mind that those things do take time and that all the people concerned are volunteers.

The minutes of the CVF Annual General Meeting held in Wolfville, NS, on May 24, 2008 as well as the minutes of the Board of Directors' meeting of May 23, 2008, May 25, 2008 and Au-

gust 10, 2008 were carefully reviewed and distributed as soon as possible after each happening to the Board, the Executive and the entire membership of the CVF for their information and retention. All these documents are accessible for perusal through your club President and/or club executive.

"Dates and Deadlines for 2008-2009", in bilingual format, were updated and sent to the CVF membership for information and action as appropriate. Thanks to all for providing the CVF Head Office, in due course, with the required information for the IVV World Calendar, which was due in Germany by September 15, 2008.

I am still the custodian/scrapbooking master of the CVF Book of Remembrance. Until further notice, all obituaries that you want to be part of our Book of Remembrance should be sent to me for action. On a completely different issue, work is being done to modernize our Website, which is a huge and time consuming project. End of this year or beginning of next year seems to be a fair estimate for its implementation.

The two new CVF Special Walking Programs for 2009, i.e. the Cenotaph Walking Program and the Waterfall Walking Program, are now available in both official languages and just awaiting your registration. They are for a five year period, starting on January 1<sup>st</sup> 2009 and ending on December 31, 2013.

I attended the 5<sup>th</sup> Northern Walk Festival, held on 18-20 July 2008 in North Bay, New Liskeard and Sudbury, ON, with fellow walkers from Ottawa, Kingston and Stirling, ON. This festival will more than likely be switched to the end of August, starting next year, which still, however, needs to be confirmed by the sponsoring clubs. The CVF Convention and AGM in North Bay, ON, in May 2009 will certainly give you a taste of the North and a desire to repeat such an experience once in a while in the future.

A personal congratulatory letter, in bilingual format, was prepared for, and forwarded to, each participant in the Winter Exercise Program. The 2008 President's Challenge Trophy was won by the Surrey Trekkers Volkssport Club. The CVF trophies for the Best Walking Festival and for the Presi-

Le compte rendu de l'assemblée générale annuelle de la FCV qui s'est tenue à Wolfville, NÉ, le 24 mai 2008 ainsi que le compte rendu des réunions du conseil d'administration du 23 mai 2008, 25 mai 2008 et du 10 août 2008 furent tous soigneusement révisés et distribués aussitôt que

possible, après chaque événement, aux membres du conseil et de l'exécutif et à tous les membres de la FCV pour leur information et rétention. Tous ces documents sont accessibles pour lecture auprès de votre président du club et/ou de son exécutif.

Les "Dates et les dates-limites pour 2008-2009", sous forme bilingue, furent mises à jour et envoyées aux membres de la FCV pour information et l'action jugée appropriée. Merci à tous d'avoir fourni au bureau de la FCV, en temps opportun, l'information requise pour le calendrier mondial IVV, qui était due en Allemagne pour le 15 septembre 2008.

Je suis toujours le gardien/maître scrapbooking du Livre du souvenir de la FCV. Jusqu'à nouvel ordre, toutes les nécrologies que vous voudriez faire paraître dans notre Livre du souvenir devront m'être envoyées pour action. Sur un point complètement différent, du travail est effectué pour moderniser notre site Web, ce qui représente un projet d'envergure et de longue durée. A few words on the last IVV Congress of Delegates, held in York, England on July 4-6, 2008, which was attended by Graham Fawcett, our Past President. Following a turbulent Congress in Estonia, last year, Graham mainly concluded that this year's meeting was a very positive and constructive one, which is promising for next year's meeting in Japan. A short version of his report is published separately in this issue for your information. Reservations for the next IVV Congress of Delegates in Japan have already been made in order to benefit from a discount on accommodation. As of now, my wife and I, as well as Graham, will be attending as the three Canadian delegates. My wife and Graham will personally assume their own expenses.

Finally, I met with my Member of Parliament on Friday, August 8, 2008 to discuss potential sponsorship, grant and other financial support from the Federal Government. He referred me to ParticipAction, a program administered by Health Canada. As well, he suggested that we approach organizations that are rarely solicited such as DND and the RCMP in order to help us with our national activities and/or events. Between now and the end of the year, the intent is to approach different potential sponsors such as financial institutions, national corporations and others to solicit their support in promoting our organization, our objectives and our mission to the Canadian population.

I wish you and your family all the best for the Holiday Season and for the New Year. May the Winter Exercise Program be another success for season 2008-2009!





Saturday evening we all gathered around to roast the traditional wiener, and do what Volksmarchers do best (besides walking) - eat.




Wiener Roast after the walk.


One of the hikers wanted to test the therapeutic properties of these unique waters with the praying hands at their base. Guess who this Volksmarcher is seated there?

The placid waters of the Thames, quiet pastoral scenes, country villages, thatched roofs, impossibly narrow canal boats, great centres of learning, world class museums, more than a few pubs, great shopping along the 'High Street', and much more, are all to be found on the Oxford Permanent Trail, a 13 km. walk offered by the Ise Valley Vagabonds of the British Walking Federation.

My wife Jane and I had the great pleasure of doing this walk after we attended the IVV meetings in York this past summer. We have rarely done a walk that offered so much variety in such a short distance. The route offered many points of cultural and historic interest, plus several sections of beautiful English countryside. The instructions we downloaded from the Internet were clear and concise, with many explanations and short anecdotes concerning the places or scenes we saw along the way to add to our understanding and pleasure.

This 'Permanent Trail', as the BWF calls its YRE's, starts from a car park just north of the City of Oxford itself, in the small village of Wolvercote. Passing through Wolvercote on narrow, winding roads, one sees thatch-roofed cottages, a few pubs, and even a very small row house appropriately dubbed "The Mousehole Cottage". The directions then lead you to an access point along the Oxford Canal where we turned south and proceeded along the towpath towards the city itself. All along the edge of the canal, there were canal houseboats of all descriptions, sizes, decoration and condition. Many Britons use these boats for holidaying, touring or even year-round living. I was told by one boat owner that there are some 4,000 miles of canals in Britain and that distances, from the boater's point of view, are not measured in miles, but hours, since that is the unit of measure they are most interested in. They would tell others that the next boatyard is six hours away, for example.

Following the Oxford Canal, one enters the City of Oxford not far from its very heart, the High Street with its shops, and then crosses through one of the world's greatest university complexes, the University of Oxford with its myriad of colleges. Oxford is not a large city and many of its greatest attractions can easily be included on a Volkssport route such as this. Since we were in Oxford in the second week of July, the University area was flooded with students, most of whom seemed to be secondary school students on end-of-year school trips from Italy, Germany and a few Eastern European countries. These students were travelling in groups before they were free for the summer, I supposed.

There are five control questions to be answered along the way and one of them concerned a pub on Blue Boar Lane, on the far side of the University. [No, I won't give you the answer here.] Since it was threatening rain at that point, we decided to take a break and have a pint. All British pubs try to have a unique character and this one was no different.

First of all, it was exceedingly small, with barely enough room to stand at the bar and not a large number of seats to sit if one wanted to. It had one further distinction, however, and that was an appallingly large number of school ties mounted in glass cases covering all the available space on the walls and ceiling. Curiously, these school ties were not complete; they were the snipped ends of school ties only. I didn't ask, but I can only imagine that if one enters this bar wearing some school tie not from the Oxford area, it would be immediately amputated and added to the collection. A little note, as for some specimen in a scientific collection, identified the date and school of the sample collected. A close examination of one panel near our seats showed tie ends going back almost sixty years!

Leaving the pub on Blue Boar Lane, we soon found ourselves back on water, but this time it was the Thames River itself. Just before we descended to the towpath, we turned a corner and saw one of the most bizarre homes I think I have ever seen. I'm not even sure the building was still occupied, but it had been designed and built with decorative Italian statuary such as one sees in gardens. There were statues of goddesses and emperors built into niches on all three stories of the building. Either some Oxonian had taken the 'grand tour of Europe' and been inspired to include such things in the design elements of his home, or he had found the garden sale of his dreams and decided to add it all to decorate his less than humble home.



The Thames at this point is three or four times as wide as the Oxford Canal we had followed previously and in a much more 'natural' state. It also flows quite rapidly and the canal boats have to struggle more to make any progress against the current if they are headed north. This part of the trail also proved to be very interesting, with great natural beauty and historic ruins along the way. We even passed near Port Meadow where there had been horse races in the 17<sup>th</sup> century and, much more recently, Lewis Carroll had been inspired to write his famous children's story, Alice in Wonderland. The real treat for us, however, came at the very end, barely a hundred meters from where we had set out four hours earlier.

If you are a fan of British mystery series as we are, then Colin Dexter's Inspector Morse has to be at the very top of your list. We had only just left the banks of the Thames and were proceeding back to the car park at Wolvercote when we crossed two magnificent stone bridges over the river, beside which we saw the Trout Inn. In the Inspector Morse series, this was Morse's favourite watering hole. It was so easy to imagine John Thaw as Morse, along with his sidekick Lewis, on the patio or at the bar of this beautiful countryside inn. As it was just before lunchtime and we had no idea of where else we might eat, what else could we do but choose to stay there until it opened? The interior is mostly decorated in stone and wood, with book covers from Colin Dexter's novels mounted in frames displayed along the walls. Needless to say, our visit was too brief, but we left properly refreshed and hydrated, I can assure you.



This walk was not at all difficult and was highly enjoyable on so many different levels. I would heartily recommend it as a 'must do' walk if you are in the Oxford area. If these few descriptions have captured your interest, I invite you to look at several dozen pictures I have put up on my web site at the address below. Sorry for how long this is to copy, but if you take the trouble to write it down, I guarantee you won't be disappointed. Please don't forget the underscores as shown.

## Report on IVV Congress of Delegates York, England July 4 – 6, 2008

It was my honour to represent the CVF at the recent IVV Congress of Delegates held in York, England, at the beginning of July. My wife, Jane, and Vicki Baker completed our three-person CVF delegation. Following a turbulent Congress in Estonia last year, it was my goal to find ways to avoid such happenings again through representations to other IVV members and very close collaboration with the AVA and its President, Curt Myron. After months of preparation, we submitted eight motions for consideration to the Congress. All were intended to improve various articles of the Statutes and Procedures in the areas of finance and the Rules of Order. There was even one motion included to add another sport under the IVV umbrella, water sports such as canoeing and kayaking.

The Congress itself was preceded by a day-long working session on Friday, when the two principal authors of the new Statutes [Constitution] went through the proposed text line by line. We were well prepared and our many comments and suggestions were received in a positive spirit of what could be done to improve the openness and transparency of the way the IVV operates. We had discovered several small inconsistencies between the English and German versions of the text, for example, plus a couple of other more important ones. All of our concerns were addressed and the appropriate changes made. Both Curt and I were thanked by two of the Vice-Presidents, and we have even been invited to be full participants in the IVV Review Commission itself. We will continue to work on the remaining documents as well as to make proposals on the IVV Rules for Event Participation. We have both accepted the invitation and begun our work. At the Congress the following day, the revised Statutes were passed without opposition. As for our motions, some of them became redundant and were withdrawn once the revisions were explained and our concerns had been addressed. Other motions not pertaining to the Statutes have been referred to the Review Commission for examination next year at the Congress in Japan.

This was not to be an election year for the members of the Presidium, as they have another three years remaining in their mandate. Each year, however, there is a form of confidence vote by the Congress delegates. I found that, given the positive attitude and progress made on revising the Statutes, plus the promise of similar conduct of IVV affairs next year, I felt comfortable voting for approval of this Presidium. The three Canadian delegates joined all others in expressing their confidence for the year to come. Other elections were also held for three important IVV Committees. I was nominated by the AVA for the Discipline Tribunal, and will now serve as one of its three members. I nominated Curt Myron of the AVA for the three-member Arbitration Board, and he was elected. Brian Tilbury of the British Walking Federation was also elected as one of two members of the Audit Committee.

The lesson of this past year and of the Congress itself has

## Rapport sur le Congrès des délégués IVV York, Angleterre du 4 au 6 juillet, 2008

Ce fut un honneur pour moi de représenter la FCV lors du dernier Congrès des délégués IVV qui a eu lieu à York, en Angleterre, au début de juillet. Ma femme, Jane, ainsi que Vicki Baker ont complété notre délégation de trois représentants. À la suite d'un congrès turbulent en Estonie l'an dernier, c'était mon objectif de trouver des moyens d'éviter la répétition de tels événements au moyen de contacts auprès des autres membres IVV et d'une collaboration très serrée avec l'association américaine et son président, Curt Myron. Après des mois de préparation, nous avons soumis huit propositions pour la considération du congrès. Toutes ces propositions avaient pour but l'amélioration de divers articles de la constitution ainsi que des procédures dans les domaines des finances et des règlements. Nous nous étions bien préparés de sorte que nos suggestions et nos nombreux commentaires furent acceptés de facon positive pour améliorer l'ouverture d'esprit et la transparence dans la conduite des affaires IVV. Nous avions repéré plusieurs petites contradictions entre les versions du texte en anglais et en allemand, par exemple, ainsi que deux autres contradictions plus importantes. L'on a adressé toutes nos questions et accepté de faire les changements proposés. Deux sur les trois viceprésidents IVV nous ont remerciés et on nous a même invités à devenir membres attitrés de la Commission de révision. Nous continuerons notre travail sur les documents qui restent et ferons des propositions sur la révision des règlements IVV sur la participation aux événements. Nous avons tous les deux accepté cette invitation et commencé notre travail. Lors du congrès, le lendemain, on a approuvé les statuts révisés sans opposition. Quant à nos huit propositions, plusieurs étaient devenues superflues, de sorte que nous les avons retirées une fois les révisions expliquées et nos soucis abordés. L'on a aussi élu Brian Tilbury de la British Walking Federation à l'un des deux postes du comité de vérification des comptes.

## Dartmouth Volksmarch Club 25th Anniversary

In 2008, the Dartmouth club is 25 years old. I thought it appropriate to write a few hi-lights of our organization over the past 25 years.

The Dartmouth Volksmarch Club, the first Canadian Club, held its first meeting in June 1983, at which Ron Colpitts brought news of the volkssport movement to our area. Ron arrived with the idea of holding one big Annual Volksmarch each year; however, those present wanted to walk more often. During that meeting it was decided to have some guided walks and we actually ended up having eight that first year. In September of the same year, we held a second meeting to formalize the Club and to give it a name.

In January 1984 our Club held its first "trails planning meeting" and the number of walks doubled from the previous year. On Natal Day Weekend (Civic Holiday) in August 1984 we held our first Annual International Volksmarch, the first in Canada sponsored by a Canadian volkssport club. Ron Colpitts was able to entice well over 100 participants for our first IVV sanctioned event. We kept increasing the number of sanctioned IVV walks until the early 1990's when we sponsored one event every Sunday year round.

In the 1980's we adopted the slogan, "Fun, Fitness, Friendship and Scenery". In the 1990's, the CVF adopted "Fun, Fitness and Friendship" for its slogan.

Lily and I had previously belonged to the West Coast Walking Club in BC and one of the memorable events we attended was their smorgasbord walk. We brought the idea of a smorgasbord walk to our Dartmouth Club and held our first picnic walk on the Labour Day Weekend in 1984. The event

was held on McNabs Island at the mouth of the Halifax Harbour and we had 96 participants. This was the start of our annual picnic walks.

On Labour Day weekend in 1987, our Club held the first Festival Multi-Day Weekend of walks in Canada. The "event" was held in beautiful Fundy National Park, New Brunswick. Social events on that weekend included barbecues, singing and dancing on Friday and Saturday nights. On Sunday evening we had a wonderful banquet in the Golf Club Restaurant. Together with perfect walking weather, the first Canadian Volkssport Festival Weekend was a complete success.

In June 1990, we held the first volkssport marathon in Canada. This was on the Dobson Trail in New Brunswick. We added the "bonus" of walking 59 kms instead of the usual 42 kms. We walked from daylight 'til dark near one of the longest days of the year. Champagne and wine flowed freely on completion of this milestone event.

In 1997 we planned, what became, our most notorious event, walking across the PEI Confederation Bridge the day before the official opening to vehicular traffic. On May 30<sup>th</sup>, 40,000 people showed up for the bridge walk and the roads leading to the Bridge could not handle them. However, we consider that walk a successful, historic event for our Club and we attracted over 400 volkssporters from all over North America to our walk and sold over 400 souvenir t-shirts and 100's of medals. The CVF's circular provincial flag logo was first designed for the souvenir t-shirts sold at the Confederation Bridge Walk

Every year since the eighties, we have held Festival Events and usually at an out-of-town location. We have been back to Fundy National Park many times, twice to Grand Manan, NB, once to Shediac / Kouchibouguac, several times to Prince Edward Island, many times to Cape Breton Island, several times to Kejimkujik National Park, the NS-NB-PEI tri-province weekend and twice to Newfoundland including one side trip to St. Pierre et Miquelon (France). In 2007 we had 176 walkers for a fabulous week on the Magdalen Islands, QC.

In addition to the above, our Club has celebrated three major anniversaries since our start up in 1983. In 1993, for our 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary, we celebrated with a walk, a sit down dinner and dance; then CVF President David Phillips and his wife Zelda from Ontario were in attendance. In 1998 we celebrated our fifteenth anniversary with a walk, dinner and commentary; then CVF President Ole Olson and Helen Viel from Ontario were in attendance. One week following Hurricane Juan, we celebrated our 20th anniversary on a warm October Thanksgiving Weekend in 2003. The weekend included a Friday night moonlight walk, a Saturday morning walk, a Sunday morning walk, and a Monday morning walk; complimentary food and refreshments were served at all events. CVF President Arne Roosen and Gisela Kibblewhite attended from British Columbia.

Current paid membership in the Dartmouth Volksmarch Club numbers 175. Since 1983 more than 1000 people have belonged to our club at one time or another.

In addition to the Blossom Walks, the 3 Victoria Volkssport clubs offer over 20 Year Round Events (YREs) in the Victoria area which you can enjoy before, during or after the Festival. Group walks will be offered on each of the four days before and the four days following the Festival. For those who would like to explore more of Vancouver Island or British Columbia, many more YRE walks are available. And in the USA, the Vancouver, Washington Discovery Walk Festival takes place the weekend following the Phoenix Festival. So there are myriad ways you can tailor a walking holiday of your own.

Victoria boasts many historic buildings and fascinating museums. The city benefits from one of Canada's mildest climates, and enjoys some of the country's most exhilarating scenery: there's an ocean or mountain vista around every corner, while the city's flower gardens are famous the world over.
