














Public postsecondary enrolment

Police-reported crime rate





Police officers per 100,000 population, by province
























Industrial capacity utilization rates




Gross sales of gasoline for motor vehicles


Canadian natural resource assets and produced assets


Emissions of carbon dioxide equivalents in Canada
