

International Police Executive Symposium

The International Police Executive Symposium (IPES) brings police researchers and practitioners together to facilitate cross-cultural, international and interdisciplinary exchanges for the enrichment of the policing profession. It encourages discussions and writing on challenging topics of contemporary importance through an array of initiatives including conferences and publications.

Founded in 1994 by Dilip K. Das, Ph.D., the IPES is a registered non-profit organization. It is funded by the benefaction of institutional supporters and sponsors that host IPES events around the world.

The IPES' major annual initiative is a four-day meeting on specific issues relevant to the policing profession. Past meeting themes have covered a broad range of topics from police education to corruption. Meetings are organized by the IPES in conjunction with sponsoring organizations in a host country. To date, meetings have been held in North America, Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

The IPES' annual meetings bring together ministers of interior and justice, police commissioners and chiefs, members of the academia representing world-renowned institutions, and many more of criminal justice's elite from over 60 countries throughout the world. The meetings facilitate interaction and the exchange of ideas and opinions on all aspects of policing. The agenda is structured to encourage dialogue in both formal and informal settings.

Compilations of selected papers from each meeting have been published or are in stages of publication preparation.

Closely associated with the IPES is the *Police Practice & Research: An International Journal (PPR)*. This journal is committed to highlighting current, innovative police practices from all over the world; providing opportunities for exchanges between police practitioners and researchers; reporting the state of public safety, internationally; focusing on successful practices that build partnerships between police practitioners and communities; as well as drawing attention to other successful police practices in relation to maintaining order, enforcing laws, and serving the community.

Call for Papers

Participants are encouraged to prepare a paper of about 25 pages in English discussing the issues below from their country's perspective. Papers should describe and analyze the responses adopted by a country's policing system to the new challenges, present original information and data, and summarize the lessons learned so far by each police service on how best to respond to the new global contexts.

- Influence of local policing models such as intelligence-led policing, proactive policing and problem-oriented policing, upon global and local crime
- Changes in the focus and strategy of training
- Adoption of technology and the importance of interoperability
- Creating, sharing and integrating intelligence at the local and global level
- Effects of integrated border security, policing immigration, and transnational policing
- Innovative policies and strategies in response to organized crime (Responding locally to impact global trends)
- Crisis and major case management
- Adoption of counter terrorism policy at the local policing level
- Effect of leadership on local and global police services

Interested individuals must submit an abstract of their proposed paper by March 1, 2006. Final papers of accepted proposals are due by April 1, 2006. For details, contact the Paper Selection Committee Chair.

Panels

Panel proposals are welcomed. They must deal directly with at least a few of the themes narrated above. Panels should comprise a balance of researchers and practitioners, pay attention to geographic distribution, and theory and practice. For details, contact the Program Committee Chair.

Each sessions will be two hours. Sessions will not overlap, allowing participation in every session. Panel sessions will have up to five papers presented. Papers not placed on panels will be presented during poster sessions; poster sessions will be announced later.
