Frequently Asked Questions

The Department of Justice Canada (DOJ), in collaboration with the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police (CACP), is pleased to present the *Minister of Justice National Youth Justice Policing Award 2012*. The Award recognizes innovative approaches to using provisions under the *Youth Criminal Justice Act* while dealing with youth in conflict with the law. It celebrates excellence in police responses to youth crime by all sworn police officers from federal, provincial, municipal, military and railway police services in Canada.

Award Program General Eligibility and Nomination Process

Who is eligible for this award?

Police officers, who individually or as a team, apply provisions under the *Youth Criminal Justice Act* in innovative and creative ways when working with youth in conflict with the law. Nominations will be accepted for activities which were initiated after December 31st, 2009.

Who can nominate candidates for the Award?

Police Services, community groups, and citizens are eligible to nominate police officers for this award. Individual police officers may nominate their colleagues.

How do I nominate a candidate for the Award?

Complete and forward the required Nomination Form to the Department of Justice, Youth Justice Initiative, 180 Elgin Street, 7th Floor, Ottawa, ON, K1A 0H8.

Nominations may also be submitted by fax at (613) 954-3294 or by email at prix.police.award@justice.gc.ca Include supporting press clippings, citations, letters of appreciation, photographs, etc.

Nominations from a member of a police service must be reviewed and signed by the Chief of Police, Director, or Commanding Officer of the police service or agency concerned.

Nominations from a community group or an individual must be copied to the Chief of Police, Director or Commanding Officer of the police service or agency concerned.

What is the deadline for nominations?

Nominations for this year's award must be received by Friday, June 8, 2012.

Who selects the winner?

The winner is selected by a committee consisting of representatives from the policing and justice communities.

When will this year's Award be presented?

This year's award will be presented at the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police Annual Conference to be held August 19-22 in Sydney, Nova Scotia.

What does the winner receive?

The winner's name is inscribed on a trophy (which remains with the winning police service for a year); he/she receives a smaller version of the trophy which he/she retains; and \$5,000.00 in funding is presented to the police service in the name of the winner. The winner's expenses are covered for the two-day stay at the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police (CACP) Annual Conference for the opening ceremony, as well as those of the winner's spouse/companion.

Please note that for team nominations, while an entire team may be nominated, only the expenses of up to a maximum of three team representatives will be covered, as well as those of their spouses/companions.

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Eligibility Criteria 1: Describe how the program or approach is creative and/or movative in dealing with youth who have come in conflict with the law.
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Eligibility Criteria 2: Indicate which of the following the program or approach supports:
• Extrajudicial measures under Part I of the <i>Youth Criminal Justice Act</i> (for example, no further action, warnings, cautions, referrals to community agencies a alternatives to the formal court system);
 Conferencing as a means of providing advice to decision makers through the
youth justice process; or
 Rehabilitation and reintegration of youth found guilty through positive police/youth activities.

Eligibility Criteria 3: Describe how the program or approach provides proportionate responses to offending conduct with one or more of the following objectives in mind:
 Helping young people understand the impact of their actions and the connection between the offence and its consequences;
• Encouraging the involvement of parents, families and the community in the rehabilitation and reintegration of youth; or
