Re: Broadcasting Public Notice CRTC 2007-30 – Application No. 2007-0164-0 by King's Kids Promotions Outreach Ministries Incorporated relating to CKKK-FM Peterborough, Ontario

- The Canadian Association of Broadcasters (CAB) the national voice of Canada's private broadcasters, representing the vast majority of Canadian programming services, including private radio and television stations, networks and specialty, pay and pay-per-view televisions services – is pleased to provide the following comments in relation to the above-noted application.
- 2. This application is to amend the licence for CKKK-FM by changing the frequency, increasing the effective radiated power, increasing the antenna height and relocating the antenna. As noted by the Commission, these technical amendments, if approved, would result in a significant increase to the authorized contours of this station and would change its status from an unprotected low-power service to a regular Class A1 service.
- 3. As the CAB has stated previously in a number of interventions concerning similar low-power applications, a low-power licensee should not be able to obtain a fully protected commercial licence simply by filing an application for a technical amendment, notwithstanding the fact that there may be certain technical issues that it is attempting to address.

- 4. In this case, the CAB recognizes that CKKK-FM has been required to vacate its current low-power frequency as a result of the Commission's recent approval of the conversion of CKPT to the FM band. In such circumstances CKKK-FM should have been expected to select another <u>unprotected low-power frequency</u> on which to continue operations, and the CAB would have been supportive of such a straightforward technical amendment to address the immediate issue.
- 5. The CAB fundamentally disagrees, however, with an approach whereby a licensee is attempting to use a simple technical amendment application to change the status of its station from a low-power operation to a protected Class A1 service.
- 6. In the current situation, if the licensee of CKKK-FM wishes to obtain a fully protected commercial licence, it should be required to file an application for a new licence. Such an application would be evaluated using the Commission's policy for assessing applications for new commercial radio services and that review, depending on the market, might or might not trigger a call for competing applications.
- 7. Accordingly, the CAB opposes the proposed technical amendments to the licence of CKKK-FM. We remain concerned about applicants using low-power radio as a springboard to enter the broadcasting system "through the back door", with few of the regulatory obligations carried by private commercial radio operators.
