I hereby certify that, after due enquiry and to the best of my knowledge and belief, the wild boars described below meet the following requirements:

1. Canada is free of foot and mouth disease, rinderpest, hog cholera, African swine fever, pseudorabies and swine vesicular disease. In addition, for at least 60 days immediately preceding the time of movement from the premises of origin, no swine erysipelas or swine plague (pasturellosis) has existed on the premises of origin or adjoining premises.
2. During the 30 days immediately preceding their dispatch the swine intended for export to the United States have been isolated in such a way as to preclude any contact with other swine or ruminants not of equal health status.
3. The swine to be exported were not previously imported into Canada from countries designated by the USDA as affected with FMD, rinderpest, African swine fever, hog cholera or swine vesicular disease.
4. The swine to be exported have been in Canada for a minimum of 60 days immediately preceding the date of export to the United States.
5. A veterinarian accredited by the CFIA has inspected the swine within thirty (30) days of the date of export and found the swine to be free of evidence of infectious and communicable disease and, as far as can be determined, exposure thereto during the preceding 30 days.

6. The swine were not vaccinated with a live, an attenuated or an inactivated vaccine during the 14 days preceding export to the United States.
7. Prior to export, all swine were individually identified by unique identification (plastic bangle tag that can be read without restraining the pigs or an equivalent) and a second permanent identification in the form of a plastic or metal ear tag, unique tattoo, brand or microchip.
8. The swine to be exported were tested negative for brucellosis using the buffered brucella antigen test (BPAT) within 30 days of export to the United States.
