

THE REGISTRAR: The hearing is now resumed.

MR. WALLACE: Good morning, Commissioner Cohen. Brian
Wallace, commission counsel, and Lara Tessaro is
with me.

Mr. Commissioner, before the hearing commenced this morning, we had a meeting of participants' counsel and it became very clear that people feel very unprepared to proceed at this point given the volume of material and the timing that has occurred. We're all working hard. No one is throwing rocks at anyone for delay here. It's just a very large job.

As a result, I would propose, Mr. Commissioner, that we not proceed this morning as planned with the Wild Salmon Policy panel. And I would like to say at this point that I would apologize for having brought our four witnesses here for that purpose this morning. I've spoken to them and they are willing to accommodate what I'm about to suggest to you.

I'm satisfied that participants' counsel require more time to deal with this properly, and indeed, the panel that follows this, Harvest Management, in a couple of weeks, and commission counsel would also benefit from a short delay.

Mr. Commissioner, I would ask that the commission adjourn until November 29th to pick up where we are now and to conduct the Wild Salmon Policy hearings during the week of November 29th with a day or two in the following week if required. And that would be four days in the week of November 29th plus the Monday and Tuesday if required; that the Harvest Management topic, which was scheduled for that period, be moved forward into January, commencing tentatively on January 17th. This is subject to confirmation of witnesses, as is the Wild Salmon Policy, but we think that that should not be a problem.

The one other piece that I suggest, Mr. Commissioner, continue to be in its current spot is the Aboriginal World View panel, which is set for the week of December 13th, and my proposal is that that stay where it is.

The other part of the discussion this morning

suggested to me that we could benefit from a little more space for preparation in the spring term. That's a more complex scheduling issue and I would propose circulating a new schedule within a week or so which puts in regular breaks in the spring for preparation.

Thank you. I'm not sure if any other counsel wish to address this.

THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you very much, Mr. Wallace, for those comments. I first want to add to Mr. Wallace's remarks my appreciation to each of the panel members for making themselves available for today and for their willingness to return on November 29th to commence what we had initially planned to commence today.

I want to also express my appreciation to Ms. Gaertner and Mr. Butcher, who last week, I think, most likely spoke for many of the participants' counsel in expressing genuinely their concern about preparation time needed for these important topics and for the volume of documents that had to be absorbed by all counsel in order to prepare properly for these hearings, which we all consider to be extremely important.

I recognize the hard work that's going on by commission counsel. I see that virtually on a daily basis. But I also see in this hearing room how well prepared counsel are with a lot of pressure to consider a volume of documents and to take their turn as the witnesses appear. We've, I think, done very well through the overview panels. Counsel have done an excellent job of preparation and have been able to ask their questions, and I've benefited greatly from the evidence and from the questions of counsel to the witnesses who have appeared on the panels.

But I am very mindful of the time pressures everybody is under. I'm grateful to commission counsel who work so hard to try and keep up with the volume of documents and the distribution of the information to participants' counsel, and I'm very grateful to participants' counsel, who in turn have been willing to work as hard to keep up. It's just obvious on the Wild Salmon Policy piece, from what I've heard in terms of the scheduling issues, that it's necessary to take this break to give everyone an opportunity to be well informed and be prepared to deal with the matter when we

return on November 29th. I believe it's for four days, but we can go into the following week if we need an extra day or so.

So I regrettably accept the fact that we have to go over because I think it's important obviously to keep this moving forward in the best fashion we can as a commission. But from the beginning I have asked, and you have returned my request, to be collaborative with regard to how these matters proceed. I know that there are a number of issues that were of concern then that probably are of concern now, and we will try our best to address those as we move forward.

I think I said last week that I would ask commission counsel to meet with participants' counsel to address the matters that Ms. Gaertner and Mr. Butcher raise, and that has happened, and as a result we now have concluded, through Mr. Wallace's comments, that this matter should go over until the 29th.

I am going to ask Mr. Wallace to consider having these meetings from time to time with counsel so that matters that are on the minds of participants' counsel and the participants can be addressed so that I become aware of them and we can try to deal as best we can with those matters in a collaborative fashion.

So again, thank you to the members of the panel. I regret that we can't go forward this morning. I believe now, Mr. Wallace, that this would mean an adjournment to 10:00 a.m. on November 29th. Is that correct?

MR. WALLACE: Thank you, Mr. Commissioner.

MR. COMMISSIONER: Thank you very much to all who came this morning and to the panel members. Thank you. THE REGISTRAR: The hearing is now adjourned until Monday, November 29th, at 10:00 a.m.
