

I beg to acknowledge receipt of correspondence
of Mr. Alfred R. Granting of licenses to fish in
the Fraser River to Indians of the Comission
Agency.

In my opinion the granting of a license
to every non-side fisherman, who is an actual
resident of the province and a British subject,
Indians included and also will pay \$10. fee, is the
only way in which the question respecting licenses
can be equitably settled.

It should be decided by the Department
that a limited number of licenses, only, are to be
issued for the Fraser River. From my opinion the
Indians of the Comission or any other Agency into
an non-resident on the Fraser would have no
claim to receive a license, which should be
considered as a right for Indians from every
Reserve, but still a pass for the same
would be issued to the Indians who are dispossessed
of their lands and are dependent upon the government.
The Reserves can be considered as
separation's on the shores of the
waters of the Province, and they have
advantages over white settlers. To be continually
travelling from place to place is agreeable to
them, but has a demoralizing tendency, and their
competition under such circumstances would be
unjust to the fishermen, and I beg to repeat that
the Comission Indians are favourably situated for
fishing all the year round, and that they can find a
market for their catch in the cities and settlements
of the Island, whereas the Fraser River Indians
have never been salt-water fishermen, but have
always depended upon the fish in the Fraser
river for their food. In order also that
freezing establishments and other fish curing
industries may be systematically and successfully
conducted, a steady resident supply of salmon is
necessary. To encourage the migration of
natives of Indians from place to place as the impuls
sets upon them would not, I submit, be conducive
~~at the greatest benefit to that of the~~
residents of the district with whom for a few
weeks they would enter into competition.

I beg to acknowledge receipt of correspondence
of 13th April, 1886, granting of licenses to fish in
the Fraser River to Indians of the Comitchean
Agency.

In my opinion the granting of a license
to every back-side fisherman, who is an actual
resident of the Province and a British subject,
Indians included and also will pay \$20. fee, is the
only way in which the question respecting licenses,
can be adequately settled.

But the Government decided by the Department
that a limited number of Indians only, are to be
issued for the Fraser River. Then, in my opinion the
Indians of the Comitchean or any other Agency who
are non-residents on the Fraser would have no
claim to a license, which could be
conceded to them, but every
American Indian who is a resident of the Province
should be allowed to fish.

The Indians of the Comitchean Agency are
situated on the coast of the Pacific Ocean, and
are in direct competition with the white
settlers of the Province, and are in many
advantages over white settlers. To be continually
travelling from place to place is agreeable to
them, but has a demoralizing tendency, and their
competition under such circumstances would be
unjust to white fishermen, and I beg to repeat that
the Comitchean Indians are favourably situated for
fishing all the year round, and that they can find a
market for their catch in the cities and settlements
of the Island, whereas the Fraser River Indians
have never been salt-water fishermen, but have
always depended upon the fish in the Fraser
River for their food. In order also that
freezing establishments and other fish curing
industries may be systematically and successfully
conducted, a steady resident supply of salmon is
