- Tests at a specialized **Moncton laboratory by the CFIA and DFO on 48 samples of sockeye** smolts found no sign of infectious salmon anemia (ISA), said Con Kiley, **CFIA national aquatic animal health program director**. "There are no confirmed cases of ISA in wild or farm salmon in B.C," he said. (widely reported) (TIMES COLONIST (VICTORIA), Page: A3, Nov 9) Read article...
- Canadian **government officials said Tuesday they have found no signs of a potentially deadly infectious salmon virus in British Columbia**. In follow-up tests, Canadian government researchers said they found nothing that would support the idea that ISA existed along the Pacific Coast. "There's no evidence that (the virus) occurs in fish off the waters of British Columbia," **Dr. Cornelius Kiley, a veterinarian with the CFIA** said during a news conference Tuesday. - Officials from the **CFIA, the national Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and British Columbia**, said they had **retested fish that advocates had collected from rivers on the Pacific coast and found no evidence of ISA**, which has devastated farmed fish in Chile and elsewhere. Yet they also said some of their tests were inconclusive, and advocates immediately questioned the government announcement. (New York Times, Nov 9) Read article...
- A **British Columbia distributor of raw mussels is recalling** its product due to concerns about **paralytic shellfish toxins**. The **CFIA** says the Sawmill Bay Mussels, distributed by Walcan Seafood of Heriot Bay, B.C., were sold Nov. 4 to 6 at Vancouver's Daily Catch store.
