Objectives:

- Provide basic support to re-establish a Lower Fraser Forum to facilitate Tier 1 (FN to FN) discussions on fisheries.
- Anticipated outcome is the development of an effective participation model for Lower Fraser River First Nations to address common issues while maintaining their individual watershed/sub-watershed AFS and AAROM groups.
- Initial focus will be at Tier 1 with anticipated plans to engage with DFO once the FN to FN model is firmly established.

(Note: This is a new initiative that started up in 2009/10 aimed at succeeding the Lower Fraser Aboriginal Resource Management organization. It is currently in the very initial stages of AAROM capacity building.)

Objectives:

- Core capacity (administrative and technical) to effectively engage with DFO on matters affecting member FNs (west coast of Vancouver Island) related to policy, fisheries management, and resource management.
- Build individual and community capacity.
- Progress towards cooperative, multi-sectoral ecosystem management.
- Improve monitoring and compliance, including First Nation catch monitoring.

First Nations Fisheries Council

This is a province-wide group largely aimed at facilitating Tier 1 and 2 (limited) processes. Management and technical capacity are being developed. Currently in capacity building phase but with additional funding support from other DFO programs such as PICFI.

Objectives:

- Support existing organization, including administrative and technical capacity.
- Facilitate engagement opportunities between the FNFC and the approximately 200 First Nation communities in BC (Tier 1 support).
- Advance the FNFC role as a liaison between FN's in the Region and DFO in bringing forward FN perspectives and recommendations on issues of regional scope.
- Facilitate joint DFO-FNFC work planning through work groups, the newly formed Joint Coordination Committee, and Executive Council meetings.
- Implement the newly mandated Council structure of the FNFC.
- Support the annual BC First Nation Fisheries Assembly.
- PICFI support provided to engage FN and work with DFO toward co-management, including development of a joint DFO-FN Co-Management Framework.

Pacific Salmon Commission – FN Caucus support

Objectives:

- Continued participation of FN representatives in the Commission, Panel and Technical Committees.
- Dissemination of information from Pacific Salmon Commission meetings to FN organizations and feedback comments on priority issues.

(Note: The Pacific Salmon Commission is the international organization established in 1985 through the Canada/U.S. Pacific Salmon Treaty. Its primary goal is to carry out the obligations of the treaty with respect to the conservation and the equitable sharing of responsibilities and benefits flowing from the Pacific salmon resource.)
