Mulroney 'never worked for Thyssen'; Firm says it's unaware of ex-PM's lobbying

The German arms manufacturer said to have paid Brian Mulroney hundreds of thousands of dollars in cash for international representation insists it has no knowledge of the former prime minister doing any work on its behalf.

In interviews with The Globe and Mail and CBC, a former Thyssen executive and a spokeswoman for the company, which changed names after a merger in 1999, said they are not aware of the lobbying that the former prime minister says he did for Thyssen in China, Russia and France between 1993 and 1994.

"He never worked for Thyssen," Winfried Haastert, a former Thyssen executive, said in a phone interview.

"Maybe Mr. Mulroney had also tried to get interest in China or Russia but not on our intention, not on our charge and we never had known about it."

Mr. Haastert said that as far as he knew, Mr. Mulroney's only connection to Thyssen was when Mr. Mulroney was still prime minister and the firm urged him to support its proposed light-armoured vehicle factory in Cape Breton.

But when the project was killed by Mr. Mulroney's government because it was too expensive, Mr. Haastert - who was embroiled in a similar scandal in Germany in the 1990s over the distribution of lobbyist Karlheinz Schreiber's secret commissions - said he considered Mr. Mulroney's involvement over.

"I cannot imagine how he could expect to sell something like this to Russia or even to China. It's absolute nonsense. Maybe he tried to support us. I don't know."

Anja Gerber, a spokeswoman for ThyssenKrupp Technologies, also said that Mr. Mulroney had "no official business with Thyssen."

All of Mr. Mulroney's dealings were through Mr. Schreiber.

The denials from Germany raise new questions about the former prime minister's testimony of two months ago, when he was called to the House of Commons ethics committee to explain the cash he accepted from Mr. Schreiber in hotel rooms between 1993 and 1994.

After years of answering questions about the cash payments through spokesmen, the former prime minister explained that Mr. Schreiber gave him an international mandate to promote military vehicles made by Thyssen, the German company that employed Mr. Schreiber as its representative in Canada.

Mr. Mulroney told the committee he promoted the military vehicles to French, Russian and Chinese leaders, both for their national needs and for use in United Nations peacekeeping operations. Mr. Mulroney later provided to the committee the dates in 1993 and 1994 of the business trips that he made to those countries.

The former prime minister has only directly identified two people with whom he spoke about buying the vehicles former Russian president Boris Yeltsin and former French president François Mitterrand. Both men are dead.

The public relations firm that is representing Mr. Mulroney did not respond to repeated requests for interviews for this story, but numerous experts on the arms trade, as well as a Mulroney-appointed ambassador, have expressed skepticism about the former prime minister's testimony.

None of the experts interviewed said they have evidence to contradict Mr. Mulroney's testimony. However, they described the work he says he did as implausible and in violation of trade sanctions Mr. Mulroney imposed while he was prime minister.

"To me, it just doesn't stand up," said Christopher Foss, an expert on military vehicles who tracks international sales for the British publication, Jane's Defence Weekly.

Mr. Mulroney would have encountered significant barriers if he attempted to sell military vehicles to China, Russia or France, the experts said. What follows is a summary of the difficulties the former prime minister would have faced in each country.

China Mr. Mulroney told the Commons ethics committee that he lobbied for Thyssen while he was in China in October, 1993.

Fred Bild, Canada's ambassador to China at the time, recalled meeting Mr. Mulroney during that particular trip, but said there was no mention of Thyssen light-armoured vehicles. Mr. Mulroney, just a few months out of office, made the trip along with prominent Canadian businessmen Paul Desmarais Sr., André Desmarais, as well as the chairman of Ontario Hydro at the time, Maurice Strong. The men were in China to announce a new joint Canadian venture called the Asia Power Group.

Mr. Bild, who was appointed by Mr. Mulroney's government, said he couldn't say for sure that Mr. Mulroney never approached Chinese officials about the military vehicles, but said he was "doubtful" that such lobbying took place.

"I would have got wind of it," Mr. Bild said, explaining that a former Canadian leader would know to consult with the embassy and the department of Foreign Affairs about a potential export as sensitive as a military vehicle.

"There is no record, any record of any kind of his having come to discuss it with the embassy. And if it was for peacekeeping, then all the more reason he should have discussed it with us, because we would have developed approaches for him. We would have had meetings, we would have arranged meetings for him with those parts of the government which deal with China's contributions to the UN efforts," he said.

"I can think of no reasons why he wouldn't come and see us; indeed, why he wouldn't even come and see us first. Because, you know, those are highly political subjects. You don't go and peddle that through some corner store agent."

Moreover, at the time of the business trip, Canada was still enforcing arms-trade sanctions against China that were introduced after the 1989 massacre of pro-democracy protesters at Tiananmen Square - sanctions that were imposed by Mr. Mulroney.

In Mr. Mulroney's Memoirs, which were released in the fall, he wrote about how he was "shocked" and "sickened" by the images of tanks shooting young Chinese students and how he took those concerns to the 1989 G7 Summit.

"Working closely together, François Mitterrand and I were able to overcome the reluctance of Japan and the United States, and impose real sanctions against China," Mr. Mulroney wrote. "These included the suspension of arms trade and World Bank loans to China...."

Mr. Mulroney's trip was about four years after the massacre. As far as Mr. Bild was concerned, the arms sanctions were still in place, the former ambassador said.

"As a recently retired prime minister who has imposed sanctions on China, I can't see myself ... going to China, making representations to break those very sanctions which are still in effect. I can't see that," Mr. Bild said.

Mr. Strong, who is currently in China, did not respond to an e-mail inquiry about Mr. Mulroney's alleged lobbying efforts in China. Paul and André Desmarais issued a "no comment" through a spokesman for Power Corporation of Canada, where both men are executives.

Russia Mr. Mulroney also testified before the committee that he lobbied former Russian president Boris Yeltsin to buy Thyssen vehicles - and by his account he didn't get very far.

During a visit to Russia in August, 1994, Mr. Mulroney asked Mr. Yeltsin about his interest in the military vehicles.

According to Mr. Mulroney, Mr. Yeltsin said he'd love to buy some but couldn't because his country was "broke."

However, defence experts said it is odd that a former Canadian leader would think to pose such a question to Mr. Yeltsin.

It was only a few years after the Cold War and Russia was trying to find commercial uses for its massive military infrastructure, thus ridding itself of armaments, not adding more, experts said.

"As for selling vehicles to the Russians - forget it," said Mr. Foss, the Jane's military researcher. "There's no way that Germany or Canada would have exported vehicles to Russia because (a) their home governments wouldn't allow it and (b) there's no requirement."

Jeremy Kinsman, who was Canada's ambassador to Russia in 1994, said he didn't know anything about Mr. Mulroney's efforts to sell the military vehicles and that he was out of the country at the time of Mr. Mulroney's alleged pitch to Mr. Yeltsin. The former ambassador acknowledged, though, that at the time Russia had no demand and too much supply when it came to armoured vehicles.

"They weren't in the market for anything in military terms in those years. Their military was really actually selling off and downsizing," said Mr. Kinsman, who was also appointed to Moscow by Mr. Mulroney's government.

Project Ploughshares, a Canadian anti-arms proliferation organization based in Waterloo, Ont., compiles data from the Department of Foreign Affairs on approved exports that are for military use. During the 1990s and into 2000, Canada approved only about \$100,000 worth of exports for military use to Russia - and almost all of it, save for \$1,000 worth of firearms, was classified as protective equipment, the organization's records show.

"I think stuff that's sort of relatively neutral like that they were willing to transfer, but other equipment - particularly armoured vehicles - would be highly unlikely," said Ken Epps, a senior official with Project Ploughshares.

France

Mr. Mulroney has also told the committee that he made two trips to France - in October, 1993, and September, 1994 - to promote the Thyssen vehicles. Again, defence experts questioned why a former Canadian prime minister would think that France - one of the world's leading exporters of armoured vehicles and arms - would be a candidate to buy military vehicles from Germany.

"You must be joking," said Mr. Foss, when asked if France would be in the market for Thyssen products at that time.

The Stockholm International Peace Research Institute, based in Sweden, maintains a database of international arms transfers.

France made a major import of armoured vehicles in 2000 - the last purchase before that was in the 1950s - according to the institute's records, which are based on open source government documents, trade publications and newspaper clippings.

The vehicles bought in 2000 - made by Sweden's Hägglunds Vehicle - are ideal for mountains and snow, and "nothing like" the infantry, fighting vehicles that Thyssen had available at the time, said Mr. Foss.

One former senior Canadian government official who is familiar with the military procurement process said any effort to sell German-made infantry vehicles to a country such as France would be futile.

"It would be like convincing the Japanese to buy a fleet of Fords for use by the Japanese government," said the former official, who spoke on the condition of anonymity.

Former prime minister Brian Mulroney and his many spokesmen have offered a variety of explanations for the cash payments he received from Karlheinz Schreiber. Here is a summary of those explanations, and how they have changed, since author William Kaplan revealed the payments in The Globe and Mail in 2003.

2003: Mr. Mulroney's spokesman, Luc Lavoie, explains to Mr. Kaplan that the former prime minister was hired "to assist Schreiber with his pasta business and to arrange a number of introductions and meetings with international business executives."

July 19, 2004: Pat MacAdam, a long-time friend of Mr. Mulroney's, sends Mr. Kaplan a fax while the author is conducting research for his impending book about the cash payments. Mr. MacAdam explains that Mr. Schreiber hired Mr. Mulroney to sell "armoured vehicles to China" and that "Schreiber also engaged Mulroney to explore the sale of pasta machines."

Jan. 25, 2005: William Thorsell, a former Globe and Mail editor and Mulroney confidant, says in an interview with Howard Goldenthal, a producer with CBC's the fifth estate, that Mr. Mulroney was hired "for representation on a couple of issues of business for Mr. Schreiber."

"Believe it or not ,this pasta machine business was going to be a big one," Mr. Thorsell said. "Apparently, it was a very good pasta machine. And he wanted to get it into McDonald's restaurants. He thought that would be a great thing because there is a big market and that's a new line for McDonald's. There was that and there was something else to do with his business in China.... It was the usual door-opening representation thing that happens to a lot of these people on law firms."

Dec. 13, 2007: Appearing before the House of Commons ethics committee, Mr. Mulroney explains that Mr. Schreiber paid him to take trips to China, Russia and France, where he "met with government and industry leaders and explored with them the prospects for this peacekeeping vehicle either for their national needs, or for use in international peacekeeping initiatives either under their sponsorship, or under the sponsorship of the United Nations."

At another point during that committee hearing, he was asked by New Democrat MP Joe Comartin whether the cash was for "the military vehicle or the pasta business also?"

"No, just the military vehicle," Mr. Mulroney replied.

Mulroney says he worked for Schreiber, not Thyssen

Former prime minister Brian Mulroney has responded to reports suggesting there is no evidence he did any work for a German arms manufacturer in exchange for cash payments from Karlheinz Schreiber.

The CBC and Globe and Mail reported Monday that a joint investigation failed to find any evidence Mulroney did international consulting work for Thyssen.

"While true, it is a puzzling new line of attack as no one, including Mr. Mulroney, has ever claimed that he worked for Thyssen AG," said a statement on the former prime minister's media relations website.

Mulroney told the House of Commons ethics committee last year he accepted three cash payments totalling \$225,000 for international consulting work he did on behalf of German-Canadian businessman Schreiber, who worked for Thyssen.

The statement, posted Monday, said Mulroney "was retained as a consultant by Thyssen Bear Head industries, (later known as Thyssen Canada) by its then Chairman Karl-Heinz Schreiber, a contract that Mr. Schreiber has described and attested to under oath."

The statement quotes transcripts from his December 2007 ethics committee appearance, including a response to a question from NDP MP Joe Comartin.

Comartin: You didn't see yourself as an employee of Thyssen.

Mulroney: No, I was an international consultant.

Mulroney told the committee he travelled to Russia, China and France on behalf of Thyssen to promote the company's armoured vehicles for national needs and for use in United Nations peacekeeping operations.

The CBC and Globe contacted officials familiar with military sales in Russia, China, France and Canada, as well as the company itself, in attempts to verify the former prime minister's claims, the CBC's Harvey Cashore said.

"While there's no evidence to disprove what Mr. Mulroney is saying, we couldn't find any evidence so far to corroborate it," Cashore said Monday.

Mulroney said he lobbied Chinese officials during a 1993 visit to Beijing, but Canada's ambassador to China at the time said the former prime minister didn't mention his lobbying once during the trip.

"As far as we at the embassy were aware, we were not aware of anything of the sort, and we would have been, normally," Fred Bild said. "I just find it very strange."

Mulroney also told the committee he lobbied former Russian president Boris Yeltsin in 1994. However, military defence expert Christopher Foss said Russia wasn't buying equipment during that time.

Foss also rejected the suggestion France was in the market for German equipment, saying it was a leading exporter of armoured vehicles. **Mulroney** said he made two trips to France to lobby.

Mulroney will have the chance to give more details himself soon. He's expected to testify again in front of the committee before the end of the month.
