Be seated, please. 6 Mr. Wolson...? 7 34685 8 34686 MR. WOLSON: Yes, good morning, Mr. Commissioner. 9 34687 It has been reported -- and I have 10 11 confirmed it -- that Mr. Schreiber has been 12 hospitalized. He underwent surgery I think last night 13 and the situation is this. I have talked to Mr. Auger, his counsel, and while of course he is not looking to 14 delay this proceeding at all, he does take the position 15 16 that, depending on his client's state of health, he would need to get instructions prior to his 17 18 cross-examination. 34688 Today is Wednesday and it is a 19 situation where we are just going to have to wait and 20 see as to his client's state of health and when he is 21 22 able to instruct his counsel. 23 34689 I wanted to put that on the record. It will explain why Mr. Schreiber is not here. He left 24 yesterday apparently in a great deal of pain and was 25

hospitalized and operated on, as I noted. 1 2 34690 So that said, Mr. Auger will have 3 some comments to make as the hours go by. 34691 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: All right. 4 5 Thank you very much. 6 34692 Mr. Pratte...? PREVIOUSLY SWORN: THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY / 7 8 SOUS LE MÊME SERMENT: THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY EXAMINATION: THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY BY MR. 9 PRATTE (Cont'd) / INTERROGATOIRE: THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN 10 11 MULRONEY PAR Mr. PRATTE (suite) 34693 MR. PRATTE: Mr. Mulroney, just for 12 13 convenience, perhaps you could have close by or at hand Binder No. 2, Tab 72. 14 You will find there -- and we will go 15 34694 16 into it in a moment, but it is an agenda of a trip you took to Asia and China in particular in September 1993. 17 18 34695 We finished yesterday by discussing 19 your knowledge and experience with the UN. You had mentioned the UN in context of some of the documents 20 that Mr. Schreiber had given you at Mirabel. 21 22 34696 How did you then propose to start on 23 this watching brief? How did that come about for Mr. Schreiber? 24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 25 34697 When

1 a few days after I returned to the cottage and had met with Mr. Schreiber some time before, I was sitting out 2 3 looking at my schedule for the upcoming weeks and months, such as it was then. I was just starting 4 5 aqain.

6 34698 But one thing that I had very firmly on my agenda was the agenda of a trip to China and 7 8 elsewhere in Asia, from October 1 to October 11. Here we are probably September 1 or thereabouts. 9

34699 So when I examined more carefully the 10 11 documentation that Mr. Schreiber had given me, 12 including the full photographs of the advertising 13 brochure, the merchandising documentation with the 14 United Nations splashed all over it, I am taking a look at my proposed agenda for China and thought that I 15 might usefully explore the concept with the leading 16 members of the United Nations, in particular the P5 17 18 countries, to begin the lengthy process of finding out 19 where they stood generally on something like this. 20 34700 So inasmuch as I was going to China, I thought that might be a good place to start. 21 22 34701 China is a member of the P5 and has 23 always taken a strong interest in the United Nations. So I figured in the absence of any specific 24 25 instructions from Mr. Schreiber, this was a good way to

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1 start.

34702 2 MR. PRATTE: Just to be clear, 3 Mr. Mulroney, your trip to China, was it arranged for that purpose or did it pre-exist? It's not the correct 4 5 word, but --6 34703 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34704 MR. PRATTE: But just explain to me 7

8 in general.

9 34705 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes.
10 34706 MR. PRATTE: We will see that the
11 names of business people involved are blocked out, but
12 I wonder, whilst respecting confidentiality, if you
13 could tell me a bit about how this trip and the
14 principal purpose of that trip was?

15 34707 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It 16 was to represent another client but, as you know, when 17 you travel that distance and are meeting the leadership 18 of China, if you have any other clients or interests it 19 is a good opportunity to explore them because of the 20 nature of the Chinese business approach.

21 34708 It is always done first, if you are 22 going at this level, in an informal, almost social 23 setting and then you move on to more precise business 24 discussions.

25 34709 MR. PRATTE: Okay. Could you go to

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the agenda now and to the date of October 5, 1993. 1 2 34710 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes...? 3 34711 MR. PRATTE: You see there that there 4 5 are various meetings that are set up. 6 34712 Let me ask you, Mr. Mulroney, the first one is at 8:30 in the morning, a potential 7 8 breakfast with the Ambassador, the Canadian Ambassador in Beijing, Mr. Fred Bild. 9 Did you know Mr. Bild? 10 34713 11 34714 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I appointed him. 12 34715 13 MR. PRATTE: Do you remember whether or not that breakfast did actually take place or did 14 15 you meet him when you were in China? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Oh, 16 34716 17 sure, yes. 18 34717 MR. PRATTE: Did you discuss with him 19 at that time, prior to going there or when you met him there, whatever business you intended to conduct, if 20 any, while you were in China? 21 22 34718 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 23 perhaps in a general fashion, but it was for private clients and that's the way you tend to conduct it. 24 25 34719 The Ambassadors can be very useful,

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1 very helpful there, but both my clients with whom I was travelling and I had our own access and friendships 2 So the embassy provided essentially, to some 3 there. extent, some support, ground support, although we 4 had -- we provided all of our own facilities and our 5 own vehicles, and so on. 6 MR. PRATTE: Okay. If we go down the 7 34720 8 list, Mr. Mulroney, then, there is a meeting at 11:30 -- well, first of all, let me ask you this 9 specifically: Any of those meetings here, were any of 10 11 them -- maybe I have asked you this already --12 specifically set up to discuss the watching brief for 13 Mr. Schreiber? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 14 34721 No. 15 I had only met him a month before and I had only come up with the idea how I might usefully set in train a 16 series of things that would be helpful to him. 17 I 18 decided to take advantage of the fact that I was going to be there for 10 or 11 days to find out if something 19 20 helpful might be done there. 34722 MR. PRATTE: Okay. So let me take 21 22 you back, then, to 11:30, the 11:30 to 13:30 slot, a 23 meeting and lunch with the Chairman of CITIC. 34723 24 Who is that person? I won't try to 25 pronounce the name, Mr. Mulroney. I'm sure you were

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better than me at that. Did you know?

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2 34724 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34725 3 MR. PRATTE: What is the name of the 4 person? 34726 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Wei 5 Ming Yi. 6 34727 MR. PRATTE: And what is CITIC? 7 8 34728 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: CITIC 9 is the -- or then was anyway, the largest development Corporation in China. 10 11 34729 MR. PRATTE: Okay. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 12 34730 13 Largely controlled by the government and I think 14 established by Rong Yiren and it became a big -- it's like a combination I suppose of the, I don't know, la 15 16 Caisse de dépôt and Investissement Québec where everything is -- it's a major player in the Chinese 17 18 economy. 19 34731 MR. PRATTE: Do you know if you discussed your idea, your concept of the P5, with the 20 Chairman of CITIC at that time? 21 22 34732 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 23 can't remember about that one. 24 34733 MR. PRATTE: Okay. 25 34734 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Ι

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eventually became a Director of this company. 1 2 MR. PRATTE: All right. Then if you 34735 3 go down, there is another meeting with the Vice-Minister, Foreign Affairs of the People's Republic 4 of China. 5 6 34736 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. That is the kind of person with whom I would have -- I 7 8 can't specifically recall, but that is the kind of person that I would have begun informal discussions 9 with. 10 11 34737 MR. PRATTE: Did you know that 12 person? 13 34738 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, I knew him well. 14 15 MR. PRATTE: And how did you know him 34739 before? 16 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 17 34740 Because he often accompanied a -- when I was there in 18 19 1986, I made a State visit to China, and Dung Chow Ping 20 was then running the show and this Mr. Yi was really in charge of the Foreign Affairs Secretariat. They spoke 21 22 excellent English and so I was able to begin a 23 relationship with him. 34741 24 MR. PRATTE: Okay. 25 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 34742 He

1 was very close to the Chairman.

2 34743 MR. PRATTE: Now let's get down the list to "Meeting and Banquet" hosted by the 3 Vice-Premier of the People's Republic of China. 4 Tell me about that. What do you 34744 5 recall about that meeting and banquet? 6 34745 First of all, was there a meeting 7 8 before the banquet? 9 34746 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, there was. This was Zhu Ronji, who was then the 10 11 Vice-Premier and Governor of the Central Bank of China. 12 And Zhu Ronji, because of our earlier association, had 13 me in for a private meeting before the banquet which he gave in our honour. 14 MR. PRATTE: When you say your prior 15 34747 16 association, what are you referring to? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: After 17 34748 18 Tiananmen Square he came to Canada and I was advised -and I was really informed that a decision had been made 19 20 in the External Affairs area that because of Tiananmen Square he would not be received by any high-ranking 21 22 official of the Government of Canada. 23 34749 Tiananmen Square had happened I think possibly two years before, and I felt that was enough 24 time for anybody in the penalty box; that I did not 25

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want to place in jeopardy, long-term jeopardy, Canada's
 relationship with China.

3 34750 Mr. Trudeau had been very active on the file. I was, Mr. Chrétien after me, and so on, and 4 I didn't want to place that in jeopardy. So I simply 5 said that I would, irrespective of what the Chinese 6 government had been informed -- because he was very 7 8 disappointed that he couldn't get really to see anybody in the political system -- that I would see him for 9 dinner at 24 Sussex. 10

1134751MR. PRATTE: This is while you are12still Prime Minister?

1334752THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: While14I was Prime Minister. So this had to be '90-'91.

15 34753 So he came over for dinner. I was 16 accompanied by one or two people and so was he. He was 17 then the Vice-Premier and he was on his way to becoming 18 Prime Minister and the most influential man in China.

1934754So this was a dinner that he was20giving in our honour, and he asked me to come by and21see him for about half an hour before we went to the22dinner.

23 34755 You know, the Chinese, it is said of 24 the Chinese that they never forget either a sleight or 25 a friendship. We were friends with China and I wanted

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1 to keep it that way.

2 34756 MR. PRATTE: You referred back to 3 this dinner, Mr. Mulroney. 34757 How would you specifically 4 5 characterize your relationship with the Vice-Premier of China by the time you go to China? I mean are you --6 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Oh, 7 34758 8 very friendly. 9 34759 MR. PRATTE: This meeting -- so there is a meeting before the banquet, just so I am clear. 10 11 34760 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34761 MR. PRATTE: Do you recall anything 12 13 you might have discussed at that meeting? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 14 34762 15 raised with him in a private general fashion the 16 main -- the issues involving the main client with whom I was travelling obviously, and I also took the liberty 17 of his invitation to discuss with him the situation of 18 another Canadian, major Canadian corporation, plus this 19 matter with the United Nations. 20 34763 I may say parenthetically that in the 21 22 first two instances the Chinese government, in a timely 23 manner, responded very favourably and my clients were able to do that which they sought to do in China. 24

25 34764 The third one, for reasons that we

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1 will -- which was the Thyssen matter. For reasons that I'm sure we will get into, nothing came to pass at the 2 3 time. MR. PRATTE: What did you -- in 34765 4 5 respect of the watching brief you had from Mr. Schreiber, the Thyssen matter, what did you say or 6 what was the discussion, to the best of your --7 8 34766 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well. 9 I can't remember the -- I raised three matters with him before dinner just in chatting. I wasn't expecting any 10 11 definitive answers then nor did I get any on anything. 12 34767 We went from there to a very lengthy banquet where I sat next to him for four hours that 13 evening and had all kinds of conversations about pretty 14 well everything that was involved in a bilateral 15 16 relationship with Canada, plus the corporate interests that I was seeking to advance. 17 18 34768 So I don't remember the specifics, 19 but I do remember that in the three cases I raised 20 obviously my interest in it, and in the Thyssen case what can I usefully do and what would you suggest, 21 22 given China's very powerful position at the United 23 Nations. Why, Mr. Mulroney, 24 34769 MR. PRATTE: 25 wouldn't you have approached this watching brief by

seeking to meet someone in the bureaucracy? 1 2 34770 I just want to get a sense of why you 3 are talking to that person as opposed to someone else or arriving with reams of paper, whatever. 4 34771 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It 5 doesn't work. You don't deal with the Chinese 6 leadership that way. It is a series of courtesies. It 7 8 is a series of long friendships and long, laborious discussions in some cases before you get down to the 9 10 nitty-gritty. 11 34772 MR. PRATTE: If you flip over the -well, yes. Ambassador Bild, was he at that meeting? 12 13 34773 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Oh, I'm sure he was somewhere at the dinner, but he wasn't 14 15 at this meeting. 16 34774 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And where were you seated at dinner? 17 18 34775 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Right on the right hand of Zhu Ronji. 19 34776 MR. PRATTE: Do you recall whether 20 Ambassador Bild was close by or close to you? 21 22 34777 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 23 He would have been -- if he was there, he would have been in the -- he would have been elsewhere in the 24 hall. 25

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MR. PRATTE: Okay. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I think the dinner was in the Great Hall, wasn't it? MR. PRATTE: Yes. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, it was in the Great Hall. MR. PRATTE: Okay. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: And so the dining facilities there are, to say the least, fairly large. MR. PRATTE: All right. Could you flip over to the next page. There is a name there, Vice-Chairman of the State, Rong Yiren. MR. PRATTE: Rong Yiren. You mentioned that name just a moment ago, I think. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. MR. PRATTE: Who is that person? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Rong Yiren was at the time the Vice-President of China. MR. PRATTE: Did you discuss your mandates or your watching brief with Mr. Yiren? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: In a general way, the same way I did it with others. Rong Yiren was an original part of

the leadership, the long march and all of that. But like many of them he was badly dealt with, he and his family, during the cultural revolution.

4 34793 He rebounded from that, as did his
5 son, as a friend of Dung Chow Ping and he emerged as
6 the creator of what we identified earlier as CITIC. He
7 was the -- I don't know if he was the founder, but he
8 was certainly the boss of CITIC.

9 34794 And he would come to Canada in that 10 capacity and that's where I met him. And over time he 11 was persuaded to accept the position of Vice-President 12 of China, which he did, but he maintained his basic 13 interest in CITIC.

14 34795 He was a very influential -15 obviously very influential man and someone well
16 acquainted with business obviously. So it was always
17 informative and instructive to deal with him.

18 34796 MR. PRATTE: Did you, during those 19 two meetings in particular did you ask whether or not 20 the Chinese would be interested in buying the vehicles 21 for which you had the brochures?

22 34797 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 23 I have made the point in other circumstances that once 24 I engaged in conversation, in the unlikely event that 25 there or somewhere else they said, by the way, I'm glad

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you mentioned it because in point of fact we need 500 1 of those vehicles immediately, could you get them for 2 3 us, I would have been on the phone in a New York minute to Mr. Schreiber and say hey, this thing has gone much 4 better than I thought, there is and -- but I wasn't 5 there to do that. I was there simply to begin the 6 process of sounding out the terrain for a more 7 8 comprehensive approach later.

9 34798 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And when you say 10 sounding out the terrain, what is the ultimate for 11 something later on -- I don't want to put words in your 12 mouth.

13 34799 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 14 34800 MR. PRATTE: I just want you to try to explain to the Commissioner what you had in mind. 15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 16 34801 Well, 17 when I sat out there and tried to reflect, as I say, on 18 what I might usefully do in the absence, 19 Mr. Commissioner, of any specific instructions from the 20 client, and I came upon the concept of the standardization and the utilization of this guite 21 22 splendid vehicle that Thyssen was producing for the 23 United Nations, I relied on my own experience with the United Nations to know of the need and the value of 24 standardization, and so on. 25

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1 34802 And the Chinese were particularly important, not only because of their enormous size and 2 3 the enormous size of their military as well, but their support of the United Nations. China was a member of 4 the P5. 5 6 34803 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: May I ask a question, please. 7 8 34804 To your knowledge, has China ever participated in a peacekeeping mission? 9 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 34805 China 10 11 has been very active in Africa in what would be 12 considered as a developmental and United Nations 13 supported initiatives, but they tend to avoid specific engagements that take them outside of China. But they 14 were a big supporter of this. 15 16 34806 And moreover, as a member of the P5, they had a veto over everything. So it was important 17 18 to try to get them onside, or at least find out 19 initially whether this was a good idea. I mean, if 20 somebody said this is a lousy idea, you know, we can never get everybody to agree to standardization or 21 22 to -- because the other part of the concept -- so I'm 23 sorry. 34807 I had planned then to visit with the 24 25 members of the P5, go to New York, see the Secretary

1 General and say look, I have met with the members of the P5 around the world. They seem to be in general 2 3 favour of this approach. I would like to flesh it out and take it further. And if I do that and come back to 4 5 you, would you then take it to the P5, to the Security Council, for the next stage of discussion and debate? 6 That would have resulted I hoped in a 7 34808 8 decision by the Security Council, which was really the P5, to say look, this makes a lot of sense. We can 9 save a lot of money doing this. 10

11 34809 The other thing I thought of -- I 12 don't know how, it might have worked out fully -- was 13 rather than -- as soon as somebody calls what happens at the United Nations -- it's more sophisticated now, 14 but then -- there would be a lot of calling around to 15 the Prime Minister of Canada, to the President of 16 Bangladesh. Could you send peacekeepers and equipment 17 18 to the Congo?

1934810You can imagine how effective that20was.

I thought that the peacekeeping section of the United Nations, if you could persuade the P5 to be the acquirer of these and the controller of this, you could then station a number of these on an emergency basis, say in Europe, in central Africa, in

Sri Lanka, and so on, so that if there was a regional 1 demand, which there always is, you would have 2 3 everything there. You would have your trained everyone from the generals down in peacekeeping, and 4 5 you would have standardized equipment, so if one got blown out by a mine, or if there was a flat tire, or 6 what have you, they are all the same, you can replace 7 8 them and move along much more efficiently. 9 34812 That was my concept. That's what I was trying to do. I don't know - I don't think it was 10 11 the greatest idea in the world, but it was one that I 12 thought might advance Mr. Schreiber's company's 13 corporate interests. 14 34813 MR. PRATTE: Mr. Mulroney, you come back from China, then, I quess, if we rely on the 15 16 schedule -17 34814 Do you have a recollection of when 18 you actually come back to Canada? 19 34815 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Oh, I am going to say - I think I got back a day or so before 20 the general election that year, whenever that was. 21 22 34816 Late October? 23 34817 MR. PRATTE: I think, maybe, a little earlier than that, if we look at the schedule. 24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 25 34818

1 Mid-October?

2 34819 I was in China on the 11th, and I had 3 to go to Paris, so I am going to say the third week of 4 October.

5 34820 MR. PRATTE: All right. Did you 6 report to Mr. Schreiber about this idea, or this trip 7 to China around that time?

8 34821 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Not9 then.

34822 When I had left Harrington Lake, I 10 11 had made a courtesy call to Fred Doucet, who had 12 arranged the meetings and so on there, simply to tell 13 Fred that the meeting had taken place, and that Mr. Schreiber had retained my services, and that I was 14 working on a concept that I hoped would be helpful. 15 Fred was - I considered him his 16 34823 17 representative, which he was - his lobbyist, which he 18 was - and he had set up the meeting with Mr. Schreiber, 19 and I felt it appropriate that I tell him, that I 20 report to him that Mr. Schreiber had retained my services to act internationally on his behalf, which 21 22 was what I then proceeded to do.

23 34824 I don't know if I called Fred after 24 coming back from China. I probably did, but I can't 25 put words in his mouth, and I can't say at that time

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that anything other than the China thing had been 1 finished and we were going to move on. 2 MR. PRATTE: Did you have occasion to 3 34825 discuss your China trip and concept, as you have 4 5 described it, with Mr. Schreiber at any point in 1993? 34826 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 6 MR. PRATTE: How did that come about? 7 34827 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 8 34828 That came about when Mr. Doucet called me in Montreal and 9 said, "Look, Mr. Schreiber is back in Canada, and he 10 would be glad of an opportunity to sit down with you." 11 34829 That worked out to a meeting in 12 December sometime, `93, I think. 13 34830 MR. PRATTE: Yes. Mr. Mulroney, on 14 the record there are two dates -15 First of all, do you remember where 16 34831 the meeting took place? 17 18 34832 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It took place in the coffee shop of the Queen Elizabeth 19 Hotel on René Lévesque Boulevard in Montreal. 20 MR. PRATTE: There are two dates that 21 34833 22 have been put forward as possibilities. One is 23 December 17th, a Friday, and December 18th, 1993. Do you have a specific recollection 24 34834

25 as to the date?

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1 34835 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 2 don't remember the date, but I think it would have been the Saturday. 3 34836 MR. PRATTE: Why do you say that? 4 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 5 34837 6 Simply because the manner in which everybody were clothed in the hotel, in a more casual way. 7 8 34838 MR. PRATTE: Do you remember 9 approximately what time the meeting might have taken place? 10 11 34839 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 12 think it was before noon, at around 11 o'clock. 34840 13 MR. PRATTE: When you attend the meeting - you said that it was a coffee shop. Can you 14 describe a bit more - how should I say - fulsomely what 15 16 you mean by that? 17 34841 Again, is it a public area, a private 18 area? 19 34842 What is it, as best you can recall? 20 34843 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It was like a Tim Hortons with more expensive coffee. 21 22 --- Laughter / Rires THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It 23 34844 was a coffee shop in a hotel in Montreal. 24 25 34845 MR. PRATTE: Were there people there

when you arrived? Was Mr. Schreiber there? 1 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 34846 think he was in the coffee shop, yes. I arrived later. 3 The coffee shop was filled with people, and he had a 4 5 table in the middle of the - the table perhaps where Mr. Doucet's lawyer is down there, and everybody was 6 around, and I sat there. 7 8 34847 MR. PRATTE: This was in 1993, Mr. 9 Mulroney. You had just stepped down a few months earlier as Prime Minister of Canada for some nine 10 11 years. When you arrive in a public place, are you recognized? 12 13 34848 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, and the affection and gratitude was pouring out of the 14 souls of everyone there. 15 16 34849 MR. PRATTE: That's Montreal. --- Laughter / Rires 17 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 18 34850 Yes, 19 of course, you are recognized when you go -20 34851 MR. PRATTE: All right. Then tell the Commissioner what you recall of the discussion 21 22 during that meeting. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: 23 34852 I can't resist this. You made that comment. You should have 24 25 come to Winnipeg.

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--- Laughter / Rires 1 2 34853 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I did. 3 34854 You know one of the things I am 4 5 proudest of, Mr. Chairman? I think we won almost every seat in Manitoba in 1984, and we did the same thing in 6 `88. So I concluded that Manitobans are particularly 7 8 forgiving souls. --- Laughter / Rires 9 34855 MR. PRATTE: All right. Mr. 10 11 Mulroney, let's travel back from Winnipeg to Montreal, at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel, in what you have 12 13 described as a coffee shop. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 14 34856 Yeah. 34857 MR. PRATTE: What do you recall of 15 16 the discussion that may have occurred that day with Mr. Schreiber? 17 18 34858 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 19 Pursuant to what you have just alluded to, I sat down and, not unexpectedly, because I had been in office 20 recently, people kept coming over to have a picture 21 22 taken with their husbands or wives, and autographs and 23 so on. So there was a little bit of a 24 34859 25 commotion.

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1 34860 And then we sat down. I suppose the meeting lasted half an hour or 40 minutes. 2 We both ordered a cup of coffee, and the first thing we talked 3 about, of course, was the results of the election and 4 5 Mr. Chrétien's new government. 6 34861 I filled him in, generally speaking, on what I had done in China. He expressed thanks for 7 8 that, and he acknowledged it, but he didn't appear to me to be particularly interested in this, which kind of 9 surprised me, because I thought, given his interest in 10 11 exports, and given what we now know, that he stood to 12 make personally \$1.8 billion if we could have secured 13 this major export market - I thought he would be much more enthusiastic at that meeting about China and the 14 P5 than he was. 15 16 34862 MR. PRATTE: All right. Did you discuss anything else? 17 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 18 34863 Yeah, 19 he had fallen in love with the Liberals. 20 34864 MR. PRATTE: What do you mean? 34865 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 21 Well, 22 his infatuation with André Ouellet, my old classmate 23 from Laval, was unbounded. He told me that the Liberals were in, and contrary to the Conservatives, he 24 had it figured out about how he was going to get this 25

deal done, now in the east end of Montreal. 1 2 Now, I knew Mr. Ouellet well -34866 probably all of my life, since we were students. 3 He is a very effective political operator, a very tough quy, 4 very successful in his business, and he was then, after 5 the election, the Minister of Foreign Affairs and the 6 senior cabinet representative from Montreal. He had a 7 8 lot of influence. 9 34867 He had been introduced to him, I think, by Mr. Lalonde, and he was very infatuated, both 10 11 with him and with the prospects of concluding a deal. 12 34868 So my conversation with him, the 13 details I provided him about China, seemed to interest him a lot less. 14 MR. PRATTE: Did you discuss, or did 15 34869 16 he ask you anything about invoicing him, or any discussions of that nature at that meeting? 17 18 34870 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. I think he testified here that he 34871 19 never asked me for an invoice, he never -20 34872 He said, I think - and it was 21 22 probably reflective of his attitude at that time, as 23 well - that he hoped he would be able -He knew that I couldn't do anything 24 34873 in those circumstances, but he hoped that he would be 25

able to reactivate me at a later date to do something 1 2 major for him. 34874 3 MR. PRATTE: Did anything else happen at the Oueen Elizabeth Hotel? 4 34875 First of all, was there any other 5 subject matter that was discussed? 6 34876 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 7 8 Basically that was it. 9 34877 MR. PRATTE: Did anything else happen at that meeting? 10 11 34878 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: He 12 said that - he had a travelling bag with - like one 13 sees often in Europe, with a strap over the shoulder. It was on the ground. He opened it and said, "I would 14 like to give you a second payment on your retainer, and 15 16 good luck," and off we went. 17 34879 MR. PRATTE: What was the form of 18 the -19 34880 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It 20 was the same kind of legal sized envelope. He put it on the table, in front of everybody in the hotel, in 21 22 the coffee shop, and he walked me to the door, and I 23 left and he went back to Germany. MR. PRATTE: What did you do with the 24 34881 25 envelope?

1 34882 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I took it home and I put it in the safe. 2 3 34883 MR. PRATTE: And what was in it? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: The 34884 4 5 same amount. 6 34885 MR. PRATTE: Seventy-five thousand dollars? 7 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 8 34886 9 34887 MR. PRATTE: In what denomination? 34888 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 10 The 11 same denominations. 34889 MR. PRATTE: Did you put this money 12 13 in a bank? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No, I 34890 14 15 kept it in the safe, as I told you. 16 34891 MR. PRATTE: So that was late 1993, Mr. Mulroney. Did you carry out any other activities 17 18 right then, or subsequently, relating to what you have described as the watching brief? 19 34892 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 20 I did. In `94 President Yeltsin of Russia called and 21 22 invited Mila and me and the children to visit with him. 23 He was arranging a trip for us in Russia, which we accepted. We went over there, and in essentially 24 similar circumstances, informal, I began the process of 25

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finding out where he stood as a member of the P5. 1 2 MR. PRATTE: And where was that? 34893 3 34894 Where did he stand? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 34895 The 4 meeting took place in Sochi. He had installed us in a 5 villa next to his own, and he would come over for 6 breakfast or lunch or dinner when we were there. 7 8 34896 One day he brought us out - flew us 9 up to an area for kind of like a family - his family and ours, kind of like a family picnic, where we spent 10 11 a number of hours in casual conversation. 12 34897 When I raised it with him, he 13 expressed interest. I think he said that he knew the company, and that they produced a superior product. 14 I knew that - he alluded to his 15 34898 16 problems that were beginning in Chechnya, and elsewhere in the Urals, and that he needed equipment. 17 18 34899 He, I think, misunderstood what I was 19 trying to say, because he said to me, "You know, Brian, 20 I would love to buy this product, but I don't have any money." I said to him, "Well, I'm not trying to sell 21 22 anything, I just want to know where Russia would stand 23 if this came to the United Nations," and he led me to believe that, if that's what it was, he would be 24 supportive. 25

34900 MR. PRATTE: Could you turn to Tab 1 74. 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 3 34901 MR. PRATTE: Do you recognize that 4 34902 5 document? 6 34903 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, I do. 7 8 34904 MR. PRATTE: What is it? 9 34905 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It is my schedule, and that of the family, for a visit to 10 11 Russia, from August 18th to the 30th, 1994. 34906 MR. PRATTE: If you go to the last 12 page of the tab, Mr. Mulroney, and look at the 13 calendar - you mentioned Sochi. If you look at the 14 23rd and 24th of August -15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 16 34907 17 34908 MR. PRATTE: -- it says "Moscow to 18 Sochi," and then Sochi to - I am not sure how to 19 pronounce that either. 20 34909 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34910 21 MR. PRATTE: Is that the place where 22 you described the meeting having taken place? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 23 34911 suppose so. I think it worked out to be longer than 24 that, but it was certainly three days, or something 25

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1 like that.

2 MR. PRATTE: Did Mr. Yeltsin indicate 34912 3 any reaction to your suggestion to him about your concept, and the P5, et cetera? 4 34913 5 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: He indicated at the end -6 He misunderstood what I had said. 7 34914 8 34915 MR. PRATTE: Yes. 9 34916 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Then, when I said, "Well, I am not trying to sell anything, I 10 11 am trying to explore the possibility of what you might think of the concept, and whether you think it's a 12 13 worthy one," he said, "Yes." 14 34917 MR. PRATTE: Why are you approaching - the same question as with China - why are 15 16 you approaching the President of Russia, in that instance, about that issue? 17 18 34918 What role would that person play in 19 the event that you wanted to take the concept forward, ultimately, to the United Nations? 20 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 21 34919 Τf 22 the President of China, unlike, kind of, rough and 23 tough democracies like ours - if the President of Russia says, "We are going to support something," you 24 don't have to have a meeting of the Public Service to 25

find out whether that's okay, it's going to happen.
The same thing in China. The same thing in other
countries, particularly in those countries that do not
have the same kind of sophisticated democratic
development that we have been privileged to have in
Canada, and which exists in the U.K., Australia, and so
on.

8 34920 I guess I could put it this way. If 9 you were interested in this kind of concept, and I am 10 confronted with this, and the President of Russia calls 11 and says, "I would like you to come over with Mila and 12 the kids for - "

13 34921 We had gotten to know him guite well. He came to visit with us, and he knew Mila very well, 14 and so on. If the guy calls and says, "I'd like you to 15 come over," and you say, "Well, no, I don't think I 16 would like to meet with you, I want to meet with the 17 18 junior assistant deputy minister of procurement," I 19 think you would be wasting a tremendous opportunity. 20 34922 He was there with his chief of staff, 21 and so on. 22 34923 Oh, one thing that he did want to 23 talk about was that he -

2434924I was a member of the Board of the25George Herbert Walker Bush Presidential Library, and he

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1 had seen that, and after he had told me, "Well, we don't have the money," thinking that I was trying to 2 3 sell it, he told me about how he - he really loved that American thing about presidential libraries, and he was 4 5 going to have one himself. 6 34925 I said, "Well, generally speaking, not all the time, but in the past a lot of the American 7 8 presidents have had to die to have this kind of library," and he said, "Well, I want one pretty badly, 9 but not that bad." 10 11 --- Laughter / Rires THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 34926 So he 12 13 was engaged in all kinds of things in that kind of 14 meeting. 15 34927 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: May I ask a 16 question, please? 17 34928 MR. PRATTE: Yes, sir. 18 34929 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Mr. Mulroney, 19 when you conversed with Mr. Yeltsin, what language were you speaking and what language was he speaking? 20 34930 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I was 21 22 speaking English and he was speaking Russian. 23 34931 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Did you have an interpreter with you, sir? 24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 25 34932 At

1 all times.

2 34933 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: From Canada? 34934 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: When 3 I was in office? 4 34935 5 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: No, when you were visiting with Mr. Yeltsin at Sochi. 6 34936 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No, 7 8 they brought in an interpreter from their mission in 9 Geneva. 34937 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: So it was a 10 11 Russian person, then. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It 12 34938 13 was a Russian person, who spoke both English and French. 14 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: I see. 15 34939 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: They 16 34940 wanted to be certain that if I spoke French, that would 17 18 be translated as well. 19 34941 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: By any chance, do you remember the name of that person? 20 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I'm 34942 21 22 sorry, I don't, sir. His chief of staff was there, as 23 34943 well, at the meetings. 24 Or one of his chiefs of staff, he had 25 34944

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1 a number of them.

2 34945 MR. PRATTE: Thank you, Mr. Mulroney. 34946 3 Now, this trip takes place in or about August, I guess, 1994. 4 34947 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 5 6 34948 MR. PRATTE: Did you conduct any other activities in the pursuit of this initiative in 7 8 that year? 9 34949 Did you speak to anybody else? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34950 10 11 In - I think it was October, maybe. I was at a Board 12 meeting in Brussels, and had to go to Paris, and Mila 13 and I checked into the hotel, and about 20 minutes later the phone rang and it was President Mitterrand, 14 who was still in office. 15 16 34951 Mr. PRATTE: Mr. Mulroney, perhaps I could refer you - since we're in France, we'll speak 17 18 the language --19 34952 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, by all means. By all means. 20 34953 Mr. PRATTE: ...to Tab 75. Perhaps 21 22 you could take a... 23 34954 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, very well. Yes. 24 Mr. PRATTE: ...a minute to read the 25 34955

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first document, which appears to be a fax to Mr. 1 Bouchard, Benoît Bouchard. 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 3 34956 34957 Mr. PRATTE: Take a moment to read it. 4 5 I just wanted to know whether it rings any bells. 6 34958 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, indeed. It's a message from my assistant, Ms. Francine 7 8 Colin(ph), in Montreal, who was contacting the Honourable Benoît Bouchard, who was the Canadian 9 Ambassador to Paris at the time, to let him know that 10 11 I'd be in Paris from September 27 to 30, and there are certain customary arrangements that are made, and 12 13 that's what Francine was doing. Mr. PRATTE: So, I just want to make 34959 14 sure I understand what you said about a telephone 15 call... 16 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 17 34960 18 34961 Mr. PRATTE: ... before your trip, 19 there was a meeting scheduled with President Mitterrand? 20 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 21 34962 22 34963 Mr. PRATTE: Well then, how did the 23 meeting come about? Maybe you could just ... 34964 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 24 assume that he... that President Mitterrand must have 25

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1 been informed by the secret service that I was in town, and he called me at the hotel to invite me and Mila to 2 3 Élysée Palace for a courtesy visit. 34965 Mr. PRATTE: O.K. And you accepted 4 his invitation? 5 6 34966 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. Yes I did. 7 8 34967 Mr. PRATTE: O.K. And did this 9 initiative in particular come up in your discussion with President Mitterrand? If so, please tell us what 10 11 was said, to the best of your recollection. 12 34968 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 13 I... I mean, we went to see him, a courtesy call. He was a remarkable man and someone with whom I had worked 14 closely. I had a lot of respect and affection for him, 15 16 and we had worked together to create the Francophone Summit. Plus, France and Canada were together on almost 17 all the G7 issues, which was important to him. He had 18 19 not only an ally, but a French-speaking one at that, the lone other country. 20 Personally, I was very impressed 21 34969 22 that, after De Gaulle's famous speech in Montreal in 23 1967, a day or two later François Mitterrand, who led

So when he invited me and Mila 10 11 to Élysée Palace, of course we accepted. 12 34971 Mr. PRATTE: And what did you discuss 13 during your visit to Élysée Palace? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: A 14 34972 15 whole range of subjects, from the Thyssen opportunity to his thoughts on death. At the time I didn't know he 16 was dying, but he, of course, did. So it was a very 17 18 fruitful discussion. 19 34973 Mr. PRATTE: What did you discuss in 20 relation to Mr. Schreiber's project or your mandate? 34974 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 21 22 Somewhat the same approach I had taken elsewhere, with 23 heads of state, and he specifically told me yes... he said: I know the company very well, because it was with 24 Helmut Kohl that he, President Mitterrand, had founded 25

BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 17 34978 18 34979 Mr. PRATTE: When and where, to the 19 best of your recollection? 20 34980 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: We were in Colorado Springs attending an event organized 21 22 by President Bush senior, moderated by Jim Lehrer of 23 The MacNeil/Lehrer Report on PBS in the United States, and it was an historical overview by President Bush on 24 the key events surrounding the end of the Cold War. 25

1 34981 So there was Mrs. Thatcher, Chancellor Kohl, President Bush, President Gorbachev, 2 President Mitterrand and myself, and this was an event 3 where everything was televised for posterity. 4 So Mitterrand was there. He had 5 34982 just... at that point, he was no longer in power. He, 6 like myself, was there as a former head of government, 7 8 and I had breakfast with him during our sessions and took the opportunity to talk to him. 9 34983 Hey, he said, any progress on that 10 11 deal of yours? Well, I told him, it's moving ahead nice and easy, not too quickly... but there's been some 12 13 progress. 14 34984 Mr. PRATTE: O.K. And what year was that, Mr. Mulroney? 15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: That 16 34985 was in October of '95. 17 18 34986 Mr. PRATTE: '95. And since we're 19 looking at '95, Mr. Mulroney... a little later I'll get 20 back to a meeting that took place in New York at the end of '94. But in '95, apart from the discussion you 21 22 had with, I believe it was former President Mitterrand 23 by then, since if I'm not mistaken he was no longer in power ... 24 25 34987 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Right.

1 34988 Mr. PRATTE: ...did you have discussions with other stakeholders from other 2 3 countries? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 34989 4 5 During that period, I had some long conversations, so I could become more familiar with the technical side, 6 with Cap Weinberger, who had served for seven or eight 7 8 years as US Defence Secretary. I had conversations with him, given his vast experience in this military field. 9 34990 And I had conversations with James 10 11 Baker, who had been Treasury Secretary, Chief of Staff 12 under President Reagan and Secretary of State for the 13 first President Bush. I remember the conversations with Mr. 14 34991 15 Baker very well, but I can't say for sure whether I 16 talked to him about the UN acquiring such a product. I did with Weinberger, but with Mr. Baker, if memory 17 18 serves, it was mainly his strategy... or should I say, his perception of how it could work with the United 19 20 Nations. 34992 Mr. PRATTE: O.K. Let's get back for a 21 22 moment to your conversations with Mr. Weinberger. Ι 23 believe you said it was a bit more technical? 34993 24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Right. 25 34994 Mr. PRATTE: And do you recall Mr.

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1 Weinberger's reaction to the discussions or to the concept you told him about? 2 34995 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 3 His position was... I have to tell you that there's 4 5 nothing worse for the US defence industry than to have... than to see part of it usurped by others, 6 including the Germans. 7 8 34996 So he said that there would be fierce 9 opposition on the part of the US defence industry, overall. PRATTE: I can't help but ask, Mr. Mulroney, three of the four people we have talked 17 18 about - Presidents Yeltsin, Mitterrand, and Mr. 19 Weinberger - are not with us any more. 20 34998 Is that right? 34999 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 21 they are dead, and four years ago, when I was in the 22 23 hospital, I almost died. If that had happened, I wouldn't be here and you wouldn't have any problems. 24 There would be no inquiry. 25

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1 35000 I should say that I was the youngest head of government in the G7, by far. It just happened 2 3 that way. 35001 If President Reagan were still 4 around, he would be 99 today, and Mitterrand would be 5 in his late eighties, and so on. 6 That's just the way it is. We all 7 35002 8 get old, and someday we die. It happens to them, it's going to happen to all of us, as well. 9 35003 MR. PRATTE: If we go back to 1994, 10 11 did you have occasion then to meet with Mr. Schreiber? 35004 12 I think the last time you had met him 13 was in 1993 at the Queen E. 14 35005 Is that right? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 15 35006 16 That's right, yes. 17 35007 MR. PRATTE: Did you then, in the 18 course of 1994, have another occasion to meet with him? 19 35008 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, I did. 20 35009 MR. PRATTE: Do you recall how that 21 22 came about? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 23 35010 24 Again, I got a telephone call from my good friend Fred Doucet. 25

1 35011 I actually began as a good friend of his brother, Gerry, and then got to know the family, 2 3 and this evolved with Fred a few years later. 35012 I got a call from Fred, who said that 4 5 Mr. Schreiber was going to be in New York for a German-American banquet of some kind, and would be 6 happy to see me on that occasion, if I were going to be 7 8 in New York. 9 35013 Fred told me, as well, that he was also - of course, Elmer had just gotten remarried 10 11 sometime before, and he was going to give a luncheon for Elmer, and he would like to invite me and Fred to 12 13 qo there. 14 35014 So it was convenient, and Fred and I went down. 15 16 35015 MR. PRATTE: There is a document, Mr. Mulroney, if you would turn - I think it's in the same 17 18 book that you have, and it's at Tab 76. 19 35016 I wonder if you could take a look at that. 20 35017 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 21 Yes. 22 35018 MR. PRATTE: It appears to be a fax 23 that was sent to your assistant, whom you have mentioned, Francine Collins -24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 25 35019 Yes.

35020 MR. PRATTE: -- from Mr. Doucet. 1 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35021 3 35022 MR. PRATTE: I wonder if you could quickly flip through these documents. 4 35023 5 Do you recall receiving these 6 documents? 35024 7 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 8 I do. 9 35025 MR. PRATTE: What did you understand the purpose of your being given those documents to have 10 11 been? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 35026 12 The 13 first is a relevant - is a message to Francine from Mr. 14 Doucet. "Dear Francine, 15 16 Could you kindly put this into 17 Mr. Mulroney's file for our New 18 York meeting. Thanks, Fred." 19 35027 Then, part of the file document deals with the Defence White Paper release and letter that 20 had taken place on December 1, a few days before. This 21 22 was a White Paper, a statement by the new Chrétien 23 government, of the way that they would like to approach national defence issues, in whatever way different from 24 what had taken place under my administration. 25

1 35028 This is always an interesting indication of the government mindset, and for a 2 3 supplier like Thyssen, it is vital for them to be aware of this as time goes on. 4 I think that Mr. Collenette was the 5 35029 new Minister of Defence, and this was his work. 6 I was sent this. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 19 35035 MR. PRATTE: What is it? 20 35036 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: It is my schedule for New York, and the event, which is 21 22 always tabbed on top, is a meeting with Mr. Karlheinz 23 Schreiber, at The Pierre Hotel, in New York, at 11 a.m., on December 8. 24 25 35037 MR. PRATTE: You may have addressed

this already, but just so I am clear, did you ask to 1 meet with Mr. Schreiber? 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 3 35038 Never, with - and we will come to that - with the 4 5 exception of the meeting in Zurich, that we will get 6 into. 35039 MR. PRATTE: Okay. But I am talking 7 8 about this meeting now, the meeting in New York. 9 35040 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 35041 MR. PRATTE: It says here that the 10 11 meeting was set for 11 a.m. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 12 35042 13 35043 MR. PRATTE: I think The Pierre Hotel is misspelled. 14 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 15 35044 16 that's right. 17 35045 MR. PRATTE: Do you go to that 18 meeting alone or with Mr. Doucet? 19 35046 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: With Mr. Doucet. 20 35047 MR. PRATTE: Maybe you could just 21 22 describe to the Commissioner what happened, then, upon 23 your arriving at the hotel. 35048 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: We 24 25 arrived at The Pierre, which, I think, is at the corner

1 of 61st and Fifth, and we went up to - Mr. Doucet must have known where, we went up to his suite. Mr. 2 Schreiber was there. Sat down. He confirmed what a 3 great event had taken place the night before, this 4 5 German-American Friendship Society, or whatever it was. I think it was at the Metropolitan Club, which is just 6 up the street a couple of blocks. I think that's where 7 8 the dinner had taken place.

Thank you very much for your good work. 12 13 35061 And I think then he said, "If we can, let's move downstairs to greet Elmer." 14 MR. PRATTE: Did you do so? 15 35062 16 35063 Did you go downstairs? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 17 35064 Yes, we went downstairs, and I think he was probably right 18 19 in his testimony - I had forgotten it - when he said that I was having some - I don't know what he said, but 20 some kind of stomach problems that day. I wasn't 21 22 feeling particularly well. So I took a few minutes 23 after they - I think I stopped on the way down, in the 24 lobby, and then joined them at the 61st Street entrance to The Pierre. 25

PRATTE: Did you proceed to the airport directly from the hotel? 14 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 15 35092 I went to -- I went to the old Chemical Bank on the 16 corner of 50th and Park and deposited what I had been 17 18 given in a safety deposit box I held in that bank. 19 35093 MR. PRATTE: The safety deposit box, was it open on that day? Did it exist before? Do you 20 have any recollection? 21 22 35094 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 23 What I recall is that what it is now -- what the bank is now called, Mr. Commissioner, is JPMorgan Chase. 24 25 35095 When I began -- left politics, I was

1 invited to join the International Advisory Board of a large bank in New York called the Chemical Bank. The 2 Chemical Bank then absorbed the Chase Manhattan and 3 that new bank subsequently absorbed JPMorgan. 4 35096 So the bank is now called JPMorgan 5 Chase. 6 35097 The Chemical Bank, when I left 7 8 office, had an International Advisory Council and the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the bank called 9 me and asked me if I would serve on that Board, which I 10 11 did. And then David Rockefeller became the 12 35098 13 head of the thing, of the combined banks, replaced eventually by Henry Kissinger, and they ran the 14 international advisory apparatus and board. 15 When I was in one of these 16 35099 incarnations at a given point in time, it probably 17 18 was -- I'm sorry, I just can't tell which exact timeframe it was. I would have said to the bank I am 19 20 going to need a safety deposit box. I am doing all kinds of confidential business here in New York. I 21 22 don't want to lug stuff around, or some documents, a 23 few documents, and I would like you to arrange for me to have a safety deposit box in the bank. 24

25 35100 And they said what area of town would

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you like and I told them where and I got an advice, an opinion at a given point in time that this has been ready and when it is convenient just drop by and sign a piece of paper on the way in and your safety deposit box is there.

6 35101 MR. PRATTE: Let me ask you directly, 7 Mr. Mulroney: Did you have this safety deposit box 8 opened in the anticipation that you would be receiving 9 monies from Mr. Schreiber at the Pierre Hotel in New 10 York on December 8, 1994?

11 35102 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 12 I didn't even have a clue that the meeting was going to 13 take place until Mr. Doucet called me a few days 14 before.

MR. PRATTE: You referred to -- and maybe you are not in a position to explain that -- some confidential business. Was there something specific, documentation that you are concerned about, that you wanted to secure, if I can use that terminology, in a safety deposit box?

2135104THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes.22I was representing some important Latin American23interests who are engaged in sensitive transactions in24New York, and we had many meetings that spilled over25into other meetings. There were a couple of documents

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on an ongoing basis that I had to secure and that's --1 and I may tell you that the reason for that was the 2 Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Latin 3 American client was on the board of JPMorgan Chase with 4 5 me. 6 35105 And it was his comment, you know, 7 look, be careful of these documents because, as you 8 know, in Latin America, while it is a great place, it is not always easy to do business. Just look at 9 Mr. Chávez and that will give you an idea of what can 10 11 happen if the wrong information gets in the wrong hands. 12 35106 13 So it was as a result of his suggestion and my need for it that I went ahead. 14 MR. PRATTE: All right. What 15 35107 16 happened to the money that you then put in a safety deposit box at what is now I understand the Chase 17 18 Manhattan Bank --19 35108 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 20 35109 MR. PRATTE: -- on December 8th. Did it stay in the United States? 21 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 22 35110 Ιt 23 stayed in the United States. 35111 24 MR. PRATTE: I didn't ask you. What 25 was the amount in the envelope?

THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Seventy-five. MR. PRATTE: In what denominations? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: The same. MR. PRATTE: \$1000 Canadian bills? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. MR. BRIAN MULRONEY: After 23 35132 Mirabel. 24 25 35133 MR. PRATTE: All right. Would you

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turn now to Binder 2. Do you have that in front of
 you? Tab 79.

3 35134 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 4 Yes...?

35135 5 MR. PRATTE: In your testimony early on yesterday you spoke about the impact of Airbus on 6 some of the events that concern this inquiry, 7 8 Mr. Mulroney. And we are only dealing with it here in terms of the impact it had on your conduct, not to 9 review necessarily the -- well, not to review the 10 11 actual merit of the allegations in a sense or the 12 Airbus matter thoroughly, but we are looking at it 13 because you alluded yesterday to the fact that it had some impact on your conduct. 14

2 35140 I just want to understand what is the3 timeframe.

THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well,
yes. Well, it had a devastating effect on me and my
family, and we learned how horrible it can be for
Canadian citizen to be caught in that kind of a web
when you are fighting the forces, the powerful forces
of your own Canadian government.

1035142And this lasted for about three11years.

12 35143 So that I, of course, knew that I had an arrangement with Mr. Schreiber completely unrelated 13 to this, totally unrelated to Airbus, but that having 14 seen the devastation that they can wreak upon families, 15 16 I didn't want the experience that we had as a family learned in Airbus to be replicated by the divulgation 17 18 on an unrelated matter that again would be distorted 19 the same way the first ones were.

PRATTE: Can you tell me, first of all, Mr. Mulroney, briefly how you found out that 14 there was a document titled, I quess, a Letter of 15 16 Request that had been forwarded to the Government of Switzerland? 17 18 35154 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Mr. 19 Schreiber. 20 35155 MR. PRATTE: And --35156 THE RIGHT HON. PRATTE: -- to the second 10 paragraph: 11 "The above three cases..." 12 35208 I'm reading, quote: 13 "The above three cases 14 demonstrate an ongoing scheme by 15 Mr. MULRONEY, Mr. MOORES, and Mr. SCHREIBER to defraud the 16 Canadian Government of millions 17 18 of dollars of public funds from 19 the time Mr. MULRONEY took 20 office in September, 1984 until he resigned in June, 1993." 21 22 35209 Unquote. Is that true or false, 23 Mr. Mulroney? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 24 35210 That 25 is completely and absolutely false.

PRATTE: Tab 4. 10 11 35215 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 12 35216 MR. PRATTE: Would you go -- well, 13 first of all, did you take any steps, after finding out this information from Mr. Schreiber, to try to deal 14 with these statements? 15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 16 35217 Yes 17 I assembled a legal team and inasmuch as this indeed. 18 had not yet been rendered public, it was being leaked, 19 as we now know, from the RCMP to Stevie Cameron and 20 through her to the fifth estate, placing in peril my reputation and the security and wellbeing of my 21 22 children and my family. 23 35218 But it wasn't -- it wasn't public then. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35225 12 13 35226 MR. PRATTE: If you go to the last page, it is dated November 8, 1995. 14 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 35227 15 November 8, 1995. 16 17 35228 MR. PRATTE: And if you go to the 18 last page it appears to be signed by Mr. Roger Tassé. 35229 19 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: That's right. 20 35230 MR. PRATTE: This is the name you 21 22 just referred to. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 23 35231 MR. PRATTE: Did you retain Mr. Tassé 24 35232 25 as part of the legal team you just referred to?

35233 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 1 did, yes. 2 MR. PRATTE: All right. And I'm 3 35234 going to take you to a few paragraphs of this letter in 4 5 a moment, but in writing to the Minister of Justice what had you asked Mr. Tassé to do? Why was he doing 6 7 that? 8 35235 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 9 I think he was asking the Minister. He is the 12 effective author in large part of the Charter of Rights 13 and Freedoms, a highly skilled and respected Deputy Minister for many years. 14 35254 When he left office, when he retired, 15 he went to a law firm in town and we retained his 16 services as legal counsel in the constitutional files. 17 18 35255 I had worked with him. I had known 19 him over the years. 20 35256 And I suppose, Mr. Commissioner, the instructions that I gave Roger, who was a remarkably 21 22 talented man: This is right out of Kafka. This is 23 nuts, what the Canadian government and the Justice Department were up to. Surely somebody up there has a 24 head on his or her shoulders. Go up there and tell 25

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1 them this: There is not a word of truth, nothing, in this thing.

I would be ready to go to Ottawa you. 3 35257 I will need anybody that they want. I will bring my 4 bank accounts with me, statement of net worth, anything 5 they want, and I will answer any question that they 6 have about me in any area of my life. 7

Who is telling us this? The answer would have been Stevie 14 35264 Cameron and a convicted felon, Giorgio Pelossi. 15 16 35265 Somebody would have said, are you 17 quys nuts? Stevie Cameron is the biggest Mulroney 18 hater in Canada. Everybody knows that. She 19 fabricates, prevaricates and has spent a lifetime 20 consumed with hatred, ill will towards the Mulroney family. Everybody knows that. 21 22 35266 And then Giorgio Pelossi is a convicted felon. 23 You mean based on this, you are 24 35267 25 telling the world that the Prime Minister of Canada was

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1 a criminal from the day he took office until the day he
2 left?

3 35268 What we were trying to do was to
4 preempt some of the publicity that could have such a
5 terrible effect, not only on my family but on any

Because, as you know -- we all know now, Mr. 10 11 Commissioner, it was a hoax, a hoax perpetrated by 12 Pelossi and Ms Cameron and the fifth estate, and all of 13 these people who rushed to judgment with such implacable hostility that it's difficult to understand. 14 It blinded them to the facts. 15 16 35639 Because they wanted so much to 17 conduct a successful vendetta against me, it blinded 18 them to what was obvious for anybody who was taking a 19 look at it. 20 35640 MR. PRATTE: Just to close that loop, Mr. Mulroney, and identify a document before I move on, 21 22 could you go to Tab 81 in Volume 2 of 3 of the big binders. 23 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 24 35641 25 35642 MR. PRATTE: I want you to identify a

1 document at Tab 81. 2 35643 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 3 It's the Settlement Agreement. 35644 MR. PRATTE: That's the document that 4 5 you were referring to? 6 35645 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: That's precisely it. 7 8 35646 And here it is right here, No. 4 --9 part of it, it's quite a document: "Based on the evidence received 10 11 to date, the RCMP acknowledges that any conclusions of 12 13 wrongdoing by the former Prime Minister were - and are -14 15 unjustified." MR. PRATTE: Would you also read, Mr. 16 35647 Mulroney, No. 6. 17 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 18 35648 19 "The parties have always 20 acknowledged that the RCMP must 21 continue investigating any 22 allegations of illegality or wrongdoing brought to its 23 attention." 24 MR. PRATTE: Ultimately, did this 25 35649

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investigation conclude?

2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 35650 the full -- this was in 1997. It went on -- the RCMP 3 conducted their investigation, Mr. Commissioner, 4 pursuant to this, for another seven years, I believe. 5 6 35651 MR. PRATTE: Let me take you, Mr. Mulroney, to Tab 99 in the same binder. 7 8 35652 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 9 35653 MR. PRATTE: There is no need to read it, I just want you to identify this document. 10 11 35654 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, this is a letter I received from the Commissioner of 12 13 the RCMP on April 17th, 2003. 14 35655 MR. PRATTE: And what did you understand this letter to do? 15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 16 35656 The Commissioner concluded by saying: 17 "On April 22, 2003, the RCMP 18 19 will announce that after an 20 exhaustive investigation in Canada and abroad, the remaining 21 22 investigation into the 1995 23 allegations of wrongdoing 24 involving MBB Helicopters, 25 Thyssen and Airbus has concluded

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1 that the outstanding allegations cannot be substantiated, and 2 3 that no charges will be laid, beyond the charge of fraud 4 [which is unrelated] which is 5 already before the courts. 6 Sincerely... the Commissioner." 7 8 35657 So here I am -- 1995 -- what was 9 that, eight years later? Eight years later, having spent millions of dollars, countless days and months of 10 11 my wife's and my children's intense discomfort and 12 concern, and I am informed by the Commissioner of the 13 RCMP that, notwithstanding the best efforts of the 14 police informants and Ms Cameron and the fifth estate, and the crowd of them: Hey, by the way, there was 15 never anything there in the first place. Sorry to have 16 17 put you through this. We regret the inconvenience, but 18 we just want to write and let you know that, hey, we're 19 still friends. Let's just forget this. We are going 20 to turn the page. You never did anything wrong, and we are sorry that we said you did. 21 22

22 35658 MR. PRATTE: Mr. Mulroney, during the 23 period of time after 1995, in the next few years when 24 this litigation was going on, did you keep contact with 25 Mr. Schreiber?

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1 35659 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: In 2 `95? 35660 MR. PRATTE: Yes, `95 and thereafter, 3 because you explained that he called you. 4 35661 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: He is 5 the one who -- the truth of the matter is, without him 6 calling me, I would not have known until, obviously, 7 8 later about this. He was in Switzerland and --9 35662 They didn't even know, these great investigators, that under Swiss law, if you send that 10 11 kind of thing, it has to be distributed, automatically, 12 to all members of the board of the bank. The thing was 13 floating around Switzerland and selling like hotcakes, and we were getting assurances from the dutiful 14 Sergeant Fiegenwald, "Don't worry, everything is being 15 done with enormous discretion." 16 17 35663 MR. PRATTE: To understand your 18 evidence, Mr. Mulroney, did you keep in contact with 19 Mr. Schreiber in the years following --20 35664 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Throughout. 21 22 35665 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And did you come 23 to see him at some point later in the 1990s? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 24 35666 I did. 25

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35667 MR. PRATTE: And how did that come 1 2 about? THE RIGHT HON. PRATTE: Let's qo to Tab 82, 7 35674 8 Mr. Mulroney. 9 35675 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35676 MR. PRATTE: There is some 10 11 information that is blanked out as being confidential, but it should be entitled, if we are in the same page, 12 "Schedule for the Right Honourable Brian Mulroney, 13 January 30-February 6, 1998". 14 Do you see that at the very top? 15 35677 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 16 35678 MR. PRATTE: There is a reference at 17 35679 the bottom, well, at the bottom and at the top, to 18 19 "Klosters". Do you see that? 20 35680 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: "Trip to Klosters". 21 22 35681 MR. PRATTE: Klosters. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: "Trip 23 35682 to Frankfurt", "Trip to Rome". 24 25 35683 I guess that was the first leg of the

1 trip.

2 35684 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And then you go 3 to February 2nd. You leave on the 30th but the next 4 thing down is February 2nd.

5 35685 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 6 I went to Klosters, the residence of Peter Munk, and 7 Peter and I went to the Davos conference for a day, I 8 think, for some business and I overnighted in the 9 Klosters and then I went down to Zürich, on my way from 10 Zürich to either Frankfurt or Rome.

11 35686 MR. PRATTE: Did you travel alone? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 12 35687 No. 13 I travelled with Paul Terrien, who was my former speech writer and was then freelancing in Ottawa. And he had 14 been a very congenial travelling partner for me when I 15 16 did many of my Washington Speaking Bureau trips around 17 the world, and he would travel with me and help me out 18 a great deal. And so he was along.

PRATTE: And there is a note 14 15 then: "Paul will meet you upon arrival 16 17 and will take care of your 18 luqqaqe." 19 35698 Paul referred to is whom? 20 35699 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, that refers to my briefcase which I couldn't carry at 21 22 all because of my problem. 23 35700 MR. PRATTE: But Paul, is that --THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Paul 24 35701 is Paul Terrien. 25

1 35702 MR. PRATTE: Okay. Then flip over 2 "Lunch in your room". THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 3 35703 That's right. 4 35704 MR. PRATTE: Why were you having 5 6 lunch in the room of the hotel as opposed to in the 7 restaurant? 8 35705 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 9 because Paul had stayed at the hotel waiting for me, and I took advantage of every pit stop that I could 10 11 because of my shoulder. 12 35706 There were things I had to take and 13 do, and I would change as well for the trip. So I went 14 in and I think we were there an hour, an hour and something, and then we got on the plane and went off 15 16 to -- as I say, I don't know if it was Rome or Frankfurt we went. 17 18 35707 MR. PRATTE: Okay. Did Mr. Schreiber 19 accept your invitation? 20 35708 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, he did. I was told that he did. BRIAN MULRONEY: 5 35720 No. 6 35721 MR. PRATTE: when he discussed the issue of the pasta machines, I think you referred to, 7 what was the exchange? How did you react to that? 8 9 35722 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Ι thought that he was going to say something to me, but 10 11 he really didn't, except we chatted about -- I was a 12 director of Archer Daniels Midland, and one of the 13 requirements apparently for this is a special strain of durum wheat, which of course Archer Daniels has a lot 14 to say in in the North American market. 15 He knew I was a director of ADM and 16 35723

we talked about that, but he didn't ask me at that time to do anything. I would have been happy to do something had he said, well look, I would like you to do -- would you do A, B and C specifically? Could you look at that? I would have been happy to do it, but he didn't raise it.

23 35724 MR. PRATTE: Archer Daniels Midland, 24 maybe not everyone is familiar with that company, but 25 just in a sentence, why would that be related to his

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interest in this pasta? 1 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 35725 Т 3 suppose if this project took off, it would be one of the principal suppliers. 4 5 35726 MR. PRATTE: Okay. 6 35727 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: There would be two main ones available, as I understood it, 7 8 in North America, Cargill and ADM. 9 35728 MR. PRATTE: Subsequent to -- well, first of all, was anything else discussed, 10 11 Mr. Mulroney, that you recall? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 12 35729 No. 13 35730 MR. PRATTE: Subsequent to that meeting and discussion, did the subject of pasta or was 14 there anything else that occurred relating to this in 15 16 the following year or two? 17 35731 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 18 not so much as between Mr. Schreiber and me, but the 19 answer to your question is yes. 20 35732 I don't remember all of the circumstances, the genesis of it, but I do remember two 21 22 specific things that occurred and that I did. BRIAN MULRONEY: 5 That's right. He was the President and Chief --6 Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the company in 7 8 Canada. 9 35745 But, as I say, I can't be certain that I spoke with -- I certainly knew him and might --10 11 he might have been the guy, but perhaps not. 12 35746 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: So you 13 thought that for the first time in history McDonald's might sell something that wasn't fattening? 14 THE RIGHT HON. I mean after all, they operate 12 100 per cent with taxpayers' money, and once they set 13 out on these vendettas, such as the one that I have had the pleasure to witness, if you are spending taxpayers' 14 money it's hard for the guy on the other side. 15 So they were on another one of their 16 35816 events there, and I thought this would be important for 17 18 us to make it very clear from Mr. Hladun that there had 19 never ever been a request for anything other than that. 20 35817 MR. PRATTE: So when he goes on to say in the rest of the paragraph, I quote: 21 22 "He would issue..." 23 35818 That is obviously Mr. Tremblay: "He would issue the letter but 24 25 first wanted an assurance or

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comfort in writing from Mr. 1 Schreiber saying that he would 2 confirm what he had said 3 publicly on many occasions, that 4 5 at no time did Brian Mulroney solicit or receive compensation 6 of any kind from Schreiber." 7 8 35819 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 9 35820 MR. PRATTE: What is that referring 10 to? 11 35821 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 12 Airbus, as Mr. Hladun confirmed. 13 35822 MR. PRATTE: Now, subsequent to this -- well, did you hear or watch a fifth estate 14 program later on, Mr. Mulroney, on or about the 20th of 15 October? 16 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 17 35823 18 35824 MR. PRATTE: Were you apprised of it? 19 35825 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I was 20 outside of the country. Yes, I was. 21 35826 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And what were you 22 told about it? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 23 35827 I was told that it was a typical fifth estate hatchet job and 24 25 that Mr. Schreiber, his arrest and what have you, was

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involved in this. I haven't seen it or even read all 1 2 of the transcript. I was told, as well, that Mr. Lavoie 3 35828 was quoted in the program referring to Mr. Schreiber in 4 5 somewhat unflattering terms. 6 35829 And the matter that I, Mr. Commissioner, found of interest and subsequently 7 8 inquired about, was that on the day of the program Mr. Greenspan, Mr. Schreiber's lawyer, had written to 9 the fifth estate saying in the letter I want to state 10 11 categorically and for the record, we understand that 12 the fifth estate is going to suggest that Britan is 13 Brian, and Brian Mulroney, trying to draw me in. This is the object of the whole 35830 14 exercise of the fifth estate is that. 15 16 35831 Greenspan says it is not Brian. I am writing to you to tell you that the Britan account 17 18 is -- this is in 1999, October 1999, Mr. Commissioner. 19 He is saying I am Schreiber's lawyer. You are telling me that -- I hear that you are going to produce this 20 program in which you are going to make this allegation. 21 22 35832 I am telling you on behalf of my 23 client it's false, and if you air this program tonight without including me, Eddie Greenspan, in your lineup, 24 you are going to be doing an enormous disservice to 25

1 Mr. Mulroney and to the truth.

They just ignored it. They throw it 2 35833 3 in the waste paper basket and off they go typically and do whatever they want, which is why I assume, 4 5 Mr. Commissioner, that Mr. Douglas Cunningham of the Ontario Superior Court of Justice eviscerated, 6 eviscerated the fifth estate crowd and their manner of 7 8 doing business for the slander and libel that they perpetrated on a doctor from Ottawa, and awarded in 9 excess of \$1 million against them for their lies and 10 11 their unprofessionalism in the most vigorous language. 12 35834 This was the modus operandi. 13 35835 MR. PRATTE: Did you --14 35836 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: This 15 is what was going on, and so obviously I was interested in knowing if Mr. Greenspan's formal request for 16 objectivity would be honoured. It was not. 17 18 35837 MR. PRATTE: So that --THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 19 35838 20 That's what I knew about that program. 21 35839 MR. PRATTE: At that time, I'm 22 talking about the fall of 1999, Mr. Mulroney, did you have communications with Mr. Schreiber? 23 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 24 35840 No. 25 MR. PRATTE: Did you hear anything 35841

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about him or from him indirectly? 1 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 35842 3 I did. I heard from Elmer McKay that he, Elmer, had picked up that Mr. Schreiber was musing that perhaps I 4 5 had an income tax problem. I had no -- I had no income tax problem, but I got the impression that 6 Mr. Schreiber was going to try and see if he 7 8 couldn't -- couldn't create one for me. 9 35843 MR. PRATTE: At this juncture, Mr. Commissioner, I would like to file a few documents, 10 11 if I can find them, and refer to others that deal with a voluntary disclosure that I will come to in a moment. 12 13 35844 Some of them are already found at Tab 26 of the Additional -- P-46, Tab 26. 14 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: What 15 35845 16 tab number? 17 35846 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: These are 18 documents emanating out of Ogilvy Renault? 19 35847 MR. PRATTE: That's right. And I will take you to one of them presently, or the witness. 20 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 21 35848 22 35849 MR. PRATTE: And then I'm here to 23 file as well additional documents, which I'm assuming the registrar has copies of, to be marked as P-49. 24 Just before I do so and also advise 25 35850

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the Commission of an agreed statement of facts in terms of the basis upon which some of this information is going in, I just want to put on the record, Mr. Commissioner, that on behalf of Mr. Mulroney we have in mind the ruling that you issued about, as you will recall, the standard ruling and references to the Income Tax Act.

8 35851 So I'm filing this at the moment with 9 the proviso that I'm dealing with these issues because 10 they are part of the factual narrative, but not in 11 order to open the door to issues of tax compliance with 12 the Income Tax Act.

13 35852 So I will ask a few questions just to fill in the factual narrative, nor either of course to 14 waive any solicitor-client privilege that Mr. Mulroney 15 16 might have had with the people who acted on his behalf. 17 35853 So I understand when you made your 18 ruling -- I'm not saying that others are agreed on the 19 basis of those filings, but that's what I'm going to 20 do.

21 35854 And when they have questions, when I 22 hear those questions, as you said, at the time we may 23 have to wait and see what the questions -- specific 24 questions are and then you may have to rule as to their 25 propriety.

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1 35855 But that's the limited extent to which I am proposing to use those documents. 2 35856 3 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Mr. Wolson, I am looking at you and I can see you looking with some 4 5 concern. 6 35857 MR. WOLSON: Well, there is no agreement regarding the nature of the questions that 7 8 others will put to the witness, and that is something you will have to deal with, as my friend said, at the 9 time. But it shouldn't be construed that there is any 10 11 agreement or consensus. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: I understand. 12 35858 13 Depending on the nature of questions that may be asked, there may be an objection and I will have to 14 rule on it. 15 MR. PRATTE: Indeed. That's all I 16 35859 was wanting to make you --17 18 35860 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Sure. Okay. 19 35861 MR. PRATTE: So in terms of the 20 additional documents that should be marked as P-43, they are -- I don't know what the terminology is in 21 22 English, but the Avis Cotisation. 23 35862 Perhaps you will know what I'm talking about, Mr. Commissioner, when the Registrar 24 puts them in front of you. 25

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COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: This is a new exhibit coming in? MR. PRATTE: It is, sir. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: And this will be P-49, I believe. MR. PRATTE: You are correct. MR. YAROSKY: Notice of Assessment. MR. PRATTE: Notice of assessment, Mr. Yarosky. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Oh, I have seen these before. MR. PRATTE: All right. In a different case, I'm sure. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Yes, my own. --- Laughter / Rires MR. PRATTE: Well, we won't expand the boundaries of the inquiry to go that far. COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: I won't be subject to cross-examination, okay. Just keep going with your filing. MR. PRATTE: Thank you, sir. So I just want to make -- you will see, Mr. Commissioner, as you look at these that the documents, the information has been blacked out and it is pursuant to a joint statement of facts that I'm

1 going to read into the record.

2 35877 I understand that Commission Counsel 3 and Mr. Vickery do not object to the filing of those documents in that form. 4 I'm talking about P-49, if I have 35878 5 that correctly. 6 They don't consent either, but they 7 35879 8 don't object. The agreement between --9 35880 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: If they don't consent and they don't object, I would like to know 10 11 what the position is. 12 35881 MR. PRATTE: Sorry. Well, they don't 13 object, so I'm asking you to receive them on the basis there are no objections to their being filed in that 14 form. 15 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: All right. 16 35882 17 35883 Would you confirm that, Mr. Vickery? 18 35884 MR. VICKERY: Yes, Commissioner. We 19 do not object to the filing of the documents in the form proposed. 20 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: All right. 21 35885 Mr. Wolson, I take it that that is 22 35886 23 the position of Commission counsel? Okay. 24 35887 MR. PRATTE: And then what I would 25 like to read, Mr. Commissioner, as a joint statement of

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facts, though, is that counsel for the parties have 1 received and reviewed partially redacted copies of 2 Mr. Mulroney's Avis de Nouvelle Cotisation and amended 3 income tax returns for the years '96, '97 and '98. 4 5 35888 Having examined the documents, counsel for the parties can confirm that the amended 6 returns increased Mr. Mulroney's "Revenus d'entreprise" 7 8 by \$37,500 in each of those years. 9 35889 So those are the facts to which 10 everyone agrees. 11 35890 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Are you going 12 to file -- is it a written agreed statement of facts or 13 the agreed statement is just what you have read? 35891 MR. PRATTE: I have just read it, 14 but --15 16 35892 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: As part of the evidence. 17 18 35893 MR. PRATTE: Yes, sir. Or if you 19 wish, we could simply have it typed up and mark it as an exhibit if you wish. 20 35894 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Well, it is 21 22 not necessary from my perspective. I have heard what 23 you had to say. It is on the record. 24 35895 MR. PRATTE: All right. Thank you, 25 sir.

1 35896 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: The Notice of Assessment and amended income tax returns, then, will 2 be received and marked as Exhibit P-49. 3 EXHIBIT NO. P-49: Notice of 4 Assessment and amended income 5 tax returns for Brian Mulroney 6 35897 7 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Go ahead, 8 please, Mr. Pratte. 9 35898 MR. PRATTE: Mr. Mulroney, I just have --10 11 35899 MR. WOLSON: When you asked counsel, 12 you asked only two counsel. You neglected to ask 13 Mr. Houston and Mr. Auger and perhaps their position should be on the record as well. 14 35900 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: I actually 15 16 didn't neglect. Mr. Pratte moved on a little quicker than I anticipated. 17 18 35901 Mr. Houston, what is your position 19 with respect to Exhibit P-49? 20 35902 MR. HOUSTON: I consent to them being filed. 21 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: You consent. 22 35903 23 You are not only not objecting, you are consenting. 35904 24 MR. HOUSTON: Correct, sir. 25 35905 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: All right.

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35906 Mr. Auger...? 1 2 35907 MR. AUGER: Not opposed, Commissioner. 3 35908 COMMISSIONER OLIPHANT: Thank you. 4 5 35909 MR. PRATTE: So, Mr. Mulroney, 6 subject to the caveats I have put on the record, I have a few questions on the issue of the income tax 7 8 treatment of the monies. 9 35910 When you received the payments we have discussed in the years you received them, in 10 11 1993-1994, can you tell me how you conceived them yourself from an income tax point of view? 12 13 35911 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: As a retainer. 14 MR. PRATTE: Which meant what to you? 15 35912 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Which 16 35913 meant that the amounts were not declarable as income 17 18 until they were taken into one's income stream as their 19 own money. 20 35914 MR. PRATTE: And when did you do 21 that? 22 35915 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: In 23 1999. 35916 MR. PRATTE: Did you -- I don't want 24

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to know what might have been discussed, but at the time

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you formed that view, did you consult any tax advisors? 1 2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35917 3 35918 MR. PRATTE: At the time you made that determination in '93-'94? 4 35919 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 5 No. 6 35920 MR. PRATTE: The conception you said about the retainer, I just want to know --7 8 35921 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Oh, no, no. I had practised law for 13 years and I had 9 been in business. I wasn't a tax lawyer, but my 10 11 understanding of the tax law was exactly what I have given you; that a retainer is not declarable as income 12 13 until it is used that way, and therefore I treated it in that manner. 14 MR. PRATTE: Okay. And the monies we 15 35922 16 have talked about and that were I quess in your safe at home -- and there was also some money in New York? 17 18 35923 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: That's right. 19 35924 MR. PRATTE: You told us about. 20 So when did you use that money for your own purposes? 21 22 35925 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: After 23 the amounts had been declared to the Ouébec and federal income tax departments and approvals had been received. 24 The cheques were paid, the taxes fully paid and the

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money became mine, having been declared as income. 1 Only then --2 3 35926 MR. PRATTE: Can I just take you --THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: --35927 4 5 did I use any of it. 6 35928 MR. PRATTE: Can I just take you, 7 Mr. Mulroney, to Tab 26. 8 35929 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 9 35930 MR. PRATTE: You will see it is a letter, a fax transmission from Ogilvy Renault. 10 11 35931 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35932 MR. PRATTE: And if you go to the 12 13 first page, there are a number of points there, one and two. Do you see that? 14 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35933 15 16 35934 MR. PRATTE: Firstly, Mr. Mulroney, this is a letter sent by Wilfrid Lefebvre of Oqilvy 17 18 Renault? 19 35935 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 35936 MR. PRATTE: And it refers, if you go 20 to the "Objet: Divulgation Volontaire" --21 22 35937 You have to say yes or no for the 23 record. THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I'm 24 35938 25 sorry, yes.

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1 35939 MR. PRATTE: Did you get involved in 2 any of the discussions that Mr. Lefebvre might have had with the Québec or federal authorities in terms of the 3 Divulgation Volontaire? 4 35940 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Not 5 at all. 6 35941 MR. PRATTE: Were you shown copies of 7 8 this document -- and there are two that follow that actually precede it in time. The last one is February 9 2, 2000. 10 11 35942 Were you shown copies of these 12 documents, as best you can recall, at the time? 13 35943 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 14 35944 MR. PRATTE: If you go to, again paragraph 2, it refers to: 15 16 (TRANSLATION) "the amounts 17 described in my letter ... 18 involve sums of \$75 000 for each 19 of the 1993, 1994 and 1995 20 taxation years." 35945 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 21 22 35946 Mr. PRATTE: Are you with me? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 23 35947 24 35948 Mr. PRATTE: So, three years... 25 35949 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yep!

35950 Mr. PRATTE: ... for a total of ...? 1 2 35951 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Two 3 hundred twenty-five thousand dollars. 35952 Mr. PRATTE: Does this amount 4 5 correspond to the sums given to you by Mr. Schreiber? 6 35953 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Absolutely. 7 8 35954 Mr. PRATTE: Once again, Mr. Mulroney, 9 without violating solicitor-client privilege, what was your perception or understanding, should I say, of the 10 11 voluntary disclosure? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 35955 12 13 voluntary disclosure is an instrument, a sort of vehicle, available to any Canadian citizen for all 14 sorts of reasons, for resolving or concluding a 15 taxation matter. 16 17 35956 So, I made a special request, so I 18 could be sure, and I was told: But there's no negative 19 liability implication stemming from this. There are all sorts of reasons that can be used, and in your case, 20 it's... that's it. There wasn't any... I think the 21 22 phrase was: No culpability whatever attaches to any 23 Canadian citizen by using a vehicle made available for the tax department, or something like that. 24 25 35957 MR. PRATTE: Did you care in terms of

specifically how the matter would be negotiated or 1 resolved in terms of the mechanics of the settlement 2 3 ultimately? THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 35958 4 5 I simply said this matter ought to be resolved in a fair and expeditious manner. Québec is the only place 6 in Canada where there are two such revenue departments, 7 8 because Ouébec collects its own such taxes. So it has to be done to the satisfaction of both, pursuant to the 9 customs and traditions and the law of the area. And I 10 11 said just resolve it. 12 35959 Any doubt, resolve in favour of the 13 government and let me know what the cost is and I will send you a cheque. 14 MR. PRATTE: I have referred, 15 35960 16 Mr. Mulroney, to the agreement where everyone confirmed that amount of \$37,500 per year was added to the tax 17 18 that you owed. 19 35961 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 20 35962 MR. PRATTE: Did you pay those amounts, to the best of your knowledge? 21 22 35963 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, I did. 23 35964 MR. PRATTE: Can you -- this is a 24 25 sensitive area, Mr. Mulroney, and I don't want to pry

1 in your personal life, financial life or otherwise obviously. But can you give the Commission a general 2 3 idea of the significance of those amounts to you. 35965 You have already talked about the 4 5 Washington Bureau in that context, but I wonder if you just could put a little bit of greater context in terms 6 of the significance, relative or otherwise, of these 7 8 additional amount you had to pay.

9 35966 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Well, 10 you know, I remember the Commissioner saying to someone 11 that \$100,000 was a lot of money to him and it is to 12 me, obviously. But at that time, and in the context I 13 suppose of my gross revenues, this was readily handled, 14 accommodated.

I explained to you some of the 15 35967 financial inflows that I had and I was extremely 16 fortunate, thank the Lord, and this is the result. 17 18 35968 MR. PRATTE: A question in the same 19 vein, Mr. Mulroney, again respecting your privacy as 20 best we can: There was a question in the Commissioner's mandate that says what happened to the 21 22 money. 35969

2335969You said that you considered it to24become income at that point in time roughly. Can you25give the Commissioner an indication of what you did

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with the money that you said you felt you had earned by then?

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THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 3 35970 Well, it was my -- it was my money at the time. It was my 4 5 private income. And I am no more thrilled at the prospect of dealing -- of talking about that than 6 anybody in this room would be, in terms of the privacy 7 8 of our lives and so on, particularly in light of the Commissioner's ruling in regard to the respect for my 9 private life and my private business dealings. 10

11 35971 But that being said, the answer to 12 the question is the answer to just about any question 13 you could ask me in this area, but particularly this: 14 I dispersed it to members of my immediate and extended 15 family in Canada and the United States -- after it was 16 mine. After it was mine.

And having been assured -- insured -assured rather, Mr. Pratte, that the manner in which I had treated this as a retainer was appropriate and proper, my view, which was sustained, was that -- so in other words, until I paid the -- when I paid the taxes, that's when they became due and exigible.

23 35973 So when I sometimes see things in the 24 media that I was late in my taxes, I know someone who 25 will disagree with that.

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1 35974 MR. PRATTE: Could I ask you a few 2 questions -- thank you, Mr. Mulroney. 35975 3 One last question in this area: When you decided to take this money into your income in the 4 5 way that you have just explained, what was your understanding of this watching brief that you had? 6 35976 Was it still alive or what happened 7 8 to it? 9 35977 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, The watching brief was for Mr. Schreiber's 10 it was. 11 corporate interests. He spoke to me -- he didn't 12 terminate anything, nor did I, in Switzerland. I was 13 clearly trying to function to help him with his new pasta products. I just thought it was ongoing and that 14 one day it would either succeed formally or fail 15 formally and that would be the end of it. 16 17 35978 We had not reached that time, but I 18 felt it was appropriate to do what I did. As I say, it 19 was in keeping with my understanding of the retainer provisions of the statutes and I treated it that way. 20 And when it became exigible, I paid the taxes on it. 21 22 35979 MR. PRATTE: Mr. Doucet testified 23 about a number of notes he made, a set of notes he made from time to time starting, if memory serves, in the 24 wake of the fifth estate program. 25

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1 35980 I am a bit out of sequence there. I should have asked you about that before. 2 Just for your reference, 3 35981 Mr. Mulroney, I'm not going to take you necessarily in 4 any detail through these but just so that the 5 Commissioner and everyone else can follow through, go 6 to Tab 89. 7 8 35982 Now we are back in one of the big books, Tab 2. 9 35983 Sorry, Volume 2, Tab 89. 10 11 35984 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 12 35985 MR. PRATTE: It has been identified 13 as a note that was typed up. It is actually originally handwritten by Mr. Doucet in the wake of his watching 14 15 the fifth estate program. 16 35986 The only question I have for you in respect to that, Mr. Mulroney, is: Were you aware at 17 18 the time that Mr. Doucet was making such a note? 19 35987 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 20 35988 MR. PRATTE: Did you ask him on your behalf to watch the show --21 22 35989 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 23 35990 MR. PRATTE: -- and record any thoughts he may have? 24 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: No. 25 35991

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35992 MR. PRATTE: If you flip to the next 1 tab, Tab 90 --2 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 3 35993 MR. PRATTE: There is another note 4 35994 5 that Mr. Doucet made. It is dated December 26, 1999 and it refers to, as he explained, a meeting that he 6 had at his house, I believe, on Boxing Day in 1999. 7 8 35995 You have to say yes or no for the 9 record. 35996 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I'm 10 11 sorry, yes. Yes. 12 35997 MR. PRATTE: First of all, let me 13 just ask you this: Did you know that Mr. MacKay -- not Mr. MacKay, Mr. Doucet and Mr. Schreiber were supposed 14 to meet on that day before the meeting happened? 15 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I 16 35998 don't believe I did. 17 18 35999 MR. PRATTE: Okay. When did you find 19 out about the fact that such a meeting did take place? 20 36000 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: I can only assume that Mr. Doucet must have called me after 21 22 it had taken place. 23 36001 MR. PRATTE: Okay. Do you recall anything he might have told you as a result of that 24 meeting, Mr. Doucet? 25

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1 36002 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Not 2 that meeting. I think he called me after another 3 meeting, and perhaps that rings a bell more than anything here. 4 36003 5 MR. PRATTE: Well, let's qo, Mr. Mulroney, then to the next meeting, or another 6 meeting, I should say. 7 8 36004 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 9 36005 MR. PRATTE: Tab 91. 36006 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 10 11 36007 MR. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 19 36010 MR. PRATTE: On January 11, 2000. 20 36011 Did you know that such a meeting was going to take place beforehand? 21 22 36012 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: This 23 one, no. MR. PRATTE: If you go to paragraph 24 36013 3 --25

36014 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes. 1 2 36015 MR. PRATTE: I wonder if you might 3 just read that paragraph to yourself and then I will have a question for you. 4 --- Pause 5 6 36016 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Not 3 at all. 4 MR. PRATTE: Would you go to page 2 36148 5 6 and read, firstly, the third paragraph. 36149 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: 7 The 8 third paragraph? 9 36150 MR. PRATTE: Let's start with the third paragraph. 10 11 36151 THE RIGHT HON. BRIAN MULRONEY: Yes, 11 this is a letter addressed to me. 12 "Dear Brian, 13 The conspiracy and cover-up action of Prime Minister Stephen 14 15 Harper, Brian Mulroney, Robert Douglas Nicholson, the Attorney 16 General of Canada and the IAG of 17 18 the Department of Justice are 19 responsible for the Proceedings 20 at the Ontario Court of Appeal 21 concerning my extradition case. 22 Please find attached a copy 23 of the letter April 3, 2007 from 24 my Lawyer Robert Hladun Q.C. to The Hon. Robert D. Nicholson, 25

Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada and the copy of the letter April 27, 2007 from the International Legal Assistance Group of the Department of Justice.

BRIAN MULRONEY: This is the letter of a blackmailer, and what he was 14 threatening me with was this litany of crimes, that he 15 alleged, that would be exposed if I did not intervene 16 with Prime Minister Harper or Attorney General Rob 17 18 Nicholson to halt or affect his extradition case. 19 36161 It was a clear case of extortion and 20 blackmail, and it was very clear what he was going to do -- what he was going to do with the false statements 21 22 that brought us here today. 23 36162 And I knew, when I read that letter, that this was clearly what he was up to. I knew that 24 my family and I would pay a price. I took the letter 25
